REV. E. O. GUERRANT, D. D.

News has reached us, just as we are going to press, of the death of this faithful servant of God and the Church. He had been spending the winter in Florida, and was on his way home to Kentucky, when the end came to him at Douglas, Ga.

Dr. Guerrant has so long been at the head of the Soul Winners' Society that he had become known all over this country as a man deeply interested in carrying the gospel to the millions of neglected mountaineers of several States. Only a man of unlimited faith and prodigious energy could have accomplished the immense amount of work that he did for them. He preached to them, he sent them missionaries and teachers, he built for them churches and schools and colleges, and he carried them always on his heart. When he felt that his strength was falling under the weight of declining years, he turned this great work over to the General Assembly, and it is being carried on under the

care of the Home Mission Committee.

Dr. Guerrant was born in Sharpsburg, Ky., February 28, 1838. He was a soldier in the Confederate army. After the war he practiced medicine until 1873, when he went to Union Theological Seminary. He was licensed and ordained by West Lexington Presbytery in 1875. His whole ministerial life was spent in his native State. He filled several pastorates, including the First church, Louisville. His great work was as superintendent of Home Missions for the Synod of Kentucky, and then in connection with the Soul Winners' Work. A great man has gone to a great reward.
