**Columbia:** The opening exercises of Columbia Seminary were begun at five P. M. September 20th. Rev. J. O. Reavis, D. D., preached the sermon, and Dr. Whaling welcomed the incoming students. Sixty men are expected this year. Quite a number are on the ground already.

**Shandon Church** has employed the Rev. W. S. Harden to preach for them each Sunday morning. Mr. Harden came to Columbia to assist Dr. Blackburn in the Arsenal Hill church, where he conducts the Sunday-school service. The Shandon church building is making good progress. This work was begun by Rev. R. B. Grinnan, D. D., three years ago, when a Sunday-school was begun. The church was organized last spring. The prospects are most excellent for a vigorous church in that suburb of Columbia.

### TENNESSEE.



Clark, of Korea, and Rev. W. L. Downing, of Texas, all of whom are alumni.

He was born in London, England, December 25, 1866, and was ordained by the Presbytery of Brazos and appointed as a missionary to China, February 9, 1899. On September 16,

1893, he was married to Miss Kate Hudson, his cousin, in the Cathedral, Shanghai, China. For twenty years he was a missionary to China. He leaves a wife and four children with the heritage of a good name and a most useful life. The funeral service was conducted at Montreat the day following his death by Revs. R. P. Smith, K. C. Anderson, George P. Stevens and E. L. Siler, and the interment was in Riverside Cemetery, Asheville, N. C.
