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The Boy Scouts have also increased and give us great encouragement. We have three troops, and the fourth is just being formed. We have also formed a group of men, independent of any religious confession, for the purpose of discussing in an honest and fraternal spirit the great moral and social questions of the day. We have also formed a cooperative society to help the people materially. We buy in large quantities, which enables us to make a small profit, which helps in the expenses of our fraternity work. Our Blue Cross (league of abstinence) has prospered also. Many young men have entered it, and we have been able to cure some drunkards. Altogether there is progress and real encouragement, and the work is full of promise. Thanks to you, our friends, who have aided us materially, and also spiritually; thanks for your fidelity. If this letter arrives in time for your annual meeting, please give to each one our thanks and our gratitude. Yours with respectful fellowship, Daniel Monod."

Through especial effort the society was able to send \$500 this year for Mr. Monod's salary. In order to keep up to this amount it will be necessary to get many new members or have those who are now general members at \$1 a year become sustaining members at \$5 or \$10 a year.
