will mean so much more to people within or without the city, it sounds so much better than any other phrase seen or heard, and, best of all, contains so much greater inspiration than any other combination of words suggested, that it seems there can be no room for discussion as to the advisability of accepting the phrase. "Corvallis, the City Beautiful" sounds as well as "Portland, the Rose City" and it means more; it more than measures up with "Salem, the Cherry City," and "Albany, the Hub City" or "Dallas, the Mill City." Placed on every piece of printing used by the business houses of Corvallis and sent out on every piece of advertising literature, it would herald to the world the aim of Corvallis if not its present appearance. Better than that, it would be constantly before our own people, a light set upon a hill, an inspiration to every reader. No man worthy of having a home in Corvallis could repeat or look at that slogan, the banner under which he is sailing, without having a desire to help make Corvallis "The City Beautiful." And that's the sort of inspiration we need. Let us adopt that slogan and then live up to it. Some might jeer at us a little, but all who came and saw the effort would be conquered, and in the end the smile of the incredulous would be changed to the applause of the admiring. Corvallis, the heart city, and seat of the State's greatest school, should be "The City Beautiful," and it can be made that with the expenditure of little more than intelligent, well-directed effort.

#### STOCK YARDS AT PORTLAND

The new Union Stock Yards at Portland will be opened for business on September 15th. The opening of these yards marks an epoch in the live stock industry of the Pacific northwest. The creation of a place of barter and sale where there is every day in the year an active demand for all of the live stock offered, means much to the farmers and ranchers of this section of the United States. The nearest market of the class is at Denver. The establishment of live stock markets such as afforded by the Portland Union Stock Yards has added millions of dollars to the value of the live stock tributary to Chicago, Kansas City, Omaha, St. Joseph, St. Louis, Fort Worth and Denver, and history will repeat itself at Portland.

Live stock sells every business day in the year and the cash that is paid out to the farmers and ranchers filters through every channel of the country's commerce. There is no better way to get grain to market and get a good price for it than in the hide of a meat animal—a method of marketing that has made the farmers of the middle states rich—and now that there will be a demand for the animals, the farmers and stockmen of this section will doubtless raise and properly feed enough live stock to meet the rapidly increasing demand.

The Portland Union Stock Yards are as complete and as modern as experience and money can make them. They are commodious, have sheds for sheep and hogs, the floors are of cement and the water and sewer systems are perfect.
