The prune packing plant quit business today at noon. A total of twenty-two cars were shipped. With the exception of the first car, the fruit was of very fine quality, and it was rumored about the packing plant that receipts from five cars of the fruit paid the entire cost of picking, packing and shipping. During the three weeks the season was on, from fifty to seventy-five people were employed, and many of the girls and women made as high as \$2.50 a day. This makes it evident that quite a lot of money was distributed in the community by the people who bought the local prune crop. Messrs. Martin and Sayers will now go north to pick the crop of two or three communities where the fruit ripens later.

GRANDMA FULLER'S CHILI SAUCE

Now that the season for preserving tomatoes has arrived, the following recipe for chili sauce will be found to be an excellent one: 18 ripe tomatoes, peeled and sliced 2 green peppers, 3 onions, chopped fine, 2 cups vinegar, 1/2 cup brown sugar, 2 tablespoonfuls salt, 1 teaspoonful cloves, 1 heaping teaspoonful cinnamon, 1/4 teaspoonful cayenne pepper. To be stewed slowly.

SEMI-PRIVATE SERVICE AT 9
