The display of apples from the Daklgren farm at Warren was especially worthy of mention there being 28 different varieties of apples, each variety being of first class quality.

The Bachelor Flat exhibits in some manner became separated and while each exhibit was very fine it would have been much more satisfactory if the exhibits could have been kept together.

First prize for general school exhibit was won by St. Helens with Warren a very close second.

Some of the Scappoose school exhibits of fruit became separated from the school display and were counted in the general fruit exhibit and the error was discovered too late to be counted as part of the school exhibit.

One or two events were cancelled on account of lack of time as the sport program was made up of ball games had not been selected.

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
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
