STATE GAME WARDEN

AND DEPUTY BROWN OF COLUMBIA COUNTY, IN CITY PAST WEEK ORGANIZING

GUN AND ROD CLUB FOR ST. HELENS

Citizens of City Are Favorable to Plan of Organizing Club—Great Benefit to Be Derived.

The time in the history of Oregon has arrived when the game of the state must be protected or only a few more years will find no sport for the hunter and nimrod. Already, old hunters, who are familiar with every cow trail in Columbia county, tell us that only a very small per cent of deer are to be found within the borders of the county, as to what was to be found only a few years ago.

For this purpose State Game Warden Carl D. Shoemaker and Deputy Warden Wm. Brown of Columbia county, were in the city the past week conferring with several prominent sportsmen with a plan to organize a Gun and Rod club, whose sole purpose is to protect and increase the game of their section. Such clubs, which have been organized over this state and others in late years, have grown to be the "live wire" clubs of their communities and have been a great factor in the preservation of wild animals and fish.

Clyde Sutherland, who is one of the leaders in the movement, conferred with Mr. Shoemaker at Portland Saturday evening, and they plan to call a meeting of the sportsmen of this section sometime the first of October, when an organization will be perfected. Moving pictures depicting animal and bird life will be given by Mr. Shoemaker, which have proven to be very interesting and entertaining.

ORDINANCE PASSED BY COUNCIL

AT REGULAR MEETING MONDAY EVENING FOR ISSUANCE OF \$40,000 WORTH OF BONDS.

Other Matters Brought Before Body—Bills Allowed.

At the regular meeting of the City Council Monday night an ordinance was read for the first time and passed providing for the issuance of funding bonds by the city in the sum of \$14,000 for the purpose of paying and redeeming outstanding general fund warrants of the city due prior to July 23, when the special election was held and the charter amendments submitted to the voters. The ordinance provides and approves the form of the bonds to be issued and the sale of the bonds.

Morris Brothers of Portland have contracted to take the bonds.
