NOTICE TO THE VOTERS OF THE CITY OF ST. HELENS

Notice is hereby given that at the regular City election to be held on the third day of April, 1916, the following proposed Charter amendment will be submitted to the voters of the City of St. Helens for their approval or rejection, which said proposed Charter amendment is contained in a resolution duly passed by the Council of said City on the 13th day of March, 1916, which proposed resolution is in words and figures as follows, to-wit:

Resolution
 Be it resolved by the Common Council of the City of St. Helens, Columbia County, Oregon, that there be and hereby is proposed for submission to the legal voters of the City of St. Helens, at the regular municipal election to be held in said City on the 3rd day of April, 1916, for their adoption or rejection, the following proposed amendment to the Charter of the City of St. Helens, being an amendment of Section 96 of the said Charter relative to the application of all income from the system of water works of said City to the payment of the operating expenses, extensions and betterments of said system, providing for a sinking fund for the payment of the water bonds of said City and the interest thereon, and providing for the investment of any money so being in such sinking fund by direction of the Water Commissioners of said City.

Charter Amendment Submitted to the Voters by the Council
 An act to amend Section 96, of the Charter of the City of St. Helens, in Columbia County and State of Oregon, entitled "An Act to amend an Act entitled an Act to amend an Act entitled an Act to incorporate the City of St. Helens, in Columbia County and State of Oregon, filed in the office of the Secretary of State, February 25, 1889.

Be it enacted by the people of the City of St. Helens.
 That Section 96 of an Act comprising the Charter of the City of St. Helens, in Columbia County, and State of Oregon, which Act is entitled "An Act to amend an Act entitled an Act to amend an Act entitled an Act to incorporate the City of St. Helens, in Columbia County, and State of Oregon, filed in the office of the Secretary of State, February 25, 1889; and as amended by the Legislative Assembly in 1893 and 1905; and as also amended by proposed Charter amendments submitted to the legal voters of the City of St. Helens on a special election held August 2, 1909; and as amended by proposed Charter amendment submitted to the legal voters of the City of St. Helens on the 4th day of April, 1910, April 7, 1913 and July 6, 1915, be amended to read as follows, to-wit:

Section 96. The commission shall apply all income from the said system of water works first, to paying the operating expenses, extensions and betterments of the said system; second, towards providing for a sinking fund for paying off the said water bonds and the interest thereon, and any money so being in said sinking fund shall by direction of said water commission, be invested in any state, county, school or municipal warrants or bonds meeting the approval of the Board of Water Commissioners, or a majority thereof, after being advised of the legal issuance of any such warrants or bonds, by competent legal counsel. Should, however, the income from the water rates not be sufficient to pay the interest on the water bonds of said City and provided for a sinking fund the commission shall certify that fact to the Common Council, and shall also certify to the said interest, and to provide for said sinking fund the said Council shall levy and collect a tax on all taxable property within the City as assessed by the County Assessor, sufficient to raise for such purposes, money to meet such requirements. All money arising from such tax shall be credited to and become a part of the water fund. Taxes levied under and for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this act shall be levied and collected the same as other taxes are levied and collected, but not oftener than once each year and the amount so collected shall not exceed one per cent of all property assessed within the corporate limits of said City.

Resolved further, that this resolution for a proposed Charter amendment to be submitted to the voters by the Council be filed with the Recorder of the City of St. Helens upon its approval by the Mayor, for submission to the legal voters of the City of St. Helens for their rejection or approval to be voted upon at the general election to be held on the 3rd day of April, 1916, as by law required.

Resolved further, that said Recorder be, and he hereby is, instructed and required to publish this resolution together with the ballot title provided by the City Attorney, at least once in official newspaper of the City of St. Helens within ten days immediately preceding said election.

FOR TEACHER AND PATRONS

Standard Teacher and Her Reasonable Duties

1. A teacher should not seek a position until she has a license to teach, and be sure that she can obtain one.
2. She should do her Reading Circle work promptly.
3. She should register her contract license before teaching a day.
4. She should have a Professional Certificate, and should present the same to her board for inspection.
5. She should be in school and ready for work not later than 8:30 A. M.
6. She should keep her room properly ventilated, and at a temperature ranging from 65 degrees to 70 degrees.
7. She should be neat and require neatness in every way.
8. She should see that her room is clean and as nearly free from dust as possible; she should insist that the janitor's work being properly done. The janitor's duties should be down in writing and should be conspicuously posted. The following are among his duties: To sweep thoroughly every floor daily; to clean all furniture daily with a damp cloth; have temperature up to 60 degrees at least by 9 o'clock A. M.; wash the black boards and toilets each week; scrub and oil floors; clean windows; make repairs; install washings, etc., and obey directions of teacher and board.
9. The teacher should follow the course of Study and obey the School rules strictly; she should report promptly to the County Superintendent, and obey his requests.
10. She should make positive daily preparation for her work.
11. She should supervise the playground, and protect the school property, especially seeing to it that the grounds and walls are kept free from weeds and writing even if it does mar new paint and varnish.
12. She should be loyal to her school, and those having authority there.
13. She should be an optimist.
14. She should maintain good discipline. Good discipline will not create noise, confusion or wasted time, and means that little Johnny is in his own seat, attending to his own work in the quietest manner; he will not whisper, borrow, lend or open his pencil during school hours. No pupil should be permitted to have a drink (ordinarily), go to the wash basin, fool around or visit during school hours. Good discipline is the first essential of good work. No pupils should ever be allowed to study from the same book, or to use a seat intended for one.
15. The teacher should share in the community life of her district, and make her school a community center. She should give a part of each week ends to her district.
16. She should do everything possible toward making her school a standard school and keeping it such.
17. She should strive to be a standard teacher in a standard school, and should do her work so well that promotion and advancement may be certain.

WHERE OUR NAMES COME FROM

Once upon a time given names were the only ones in use. One was Tom, Dick or Harry, and that was all there was about it. Our present surnames arose from nicknames. Thus Tom the Tailor became in time Tom Taylor and his descendants used Taylor as a family name. The most familiar of our surnames were derived from the occupations of our forefathers as Smiths, Bakers, Brewers, etc. Many men, moving to new towns, had the name of the place from which they had come fastened upon them. Others took names like Pope, King and Bishop, from playing those parts in plays. Hog and Bacon are simple. Purcell developed from porcull, meaning little pig. Galt and Grice are old dialect words of the same meaning. Tod meant fox, Flitchie was pole cat, and so the keen student of language traces the beginnings of our names in the old dialects. Some of the nicknames were originally distinctly uncomplimentary, as Seely for silly, Cameron, for crooked nose, and Kennedy for ugly head. Grace developed from gras or fat—The American Boy.

GREAT IS OREGON

Oregon consumes annually over 2,200,000 cords of fuel wood, which, reduced to board feet, amounts to over 1,105,000,000 feet.
 Oregon produces annually approximately 1,610,000,000 board feet of logs, but consumes over two billion, or 27 1/2 per cent in excess of her log production. She draws heavily on Washington for this excess.
 Oregon produces approximately three and one-third million linear feet, but consumes only about one-half a million feet.
 The railroads of Oregon consume over 18,000 hewn ties and the mines 22,000. Oregon also consumes 66,000 linear feet of round mine material.
 Oregon produces over two billion feet of lumber, approximately 160 million lath, and 275 1/2 million shingles. Of this quantity, she consumes nearly 23 million lath and over 116 million shingles. Of the amount of lumber produced, Oregon consumes 19.8 per cent or 411 million board feet, over half of which is used for building purposes. Nearly half of the building material, of the lath and of the shingles, is used in Multnomah and Clackamas counties.
