APIARY FARMER DIES ALONE

Daughter Goes for Aid, Which Comes Too Late.

J. E. Mellen, a farmer living about ten miles back of Rainier, died suddenly Thursday morning last week. He had been suffering with asthma, and his 22 year old daughter, his sole companion, seeing how sick her father was, started for a neighbor's house, a few miles distant, to summon a Rainier doctor. When she returned her father was dead. Coroner White was called because the man died while alone and without the care of a physician, but since it was evident that death resulted from natural causes he thought it was unnecessary to hold an inquest. The dead man left a wife and daughter who live in Seattle; a son who works for the Benson Timber Company at Clatskanie, and the daughter who lived with him. He had been living on his place for the past five years and was quite well known in the Aplary district.

SOUTHWESTERN DESERT ANIMALS

The desert animals of the southwest are small and are not often in sight. The rats, which live in large colonies in the sandy areas, are nocturnal, and most of their companions have the same habit. Various lizards and the bold little horned toad are abundant, and in places the variety of rattlesnake known as "sidewinder" is found. This common name refers to his sideling motion both in locomotion and attack. The rare tiger rattler lives in the rocks in many out of the way places. The Gila monster is reported from the Colorado bottoms near Needles and even along Virgin river in southern Utah. The larger lizard, known as the chuckwalla, may be seen here and there, and the Indians find him as palatable as chicken. The tortoise roams widely over the desert, and its empty shell, from 8 to 10 inches long, is a common sight.

THE COLORADO WAS "FIREBRAND RIVER"

The Colorado river was reached by two of the early Spanish explorers from Mexico in 1540. One of the explorers was Melchior Diaz, who came across country and went only a short distance above Yuma, and the other was Hernando de Alarcon, who came in boats from western Mexico. Owing to the custom of the natives of carrying firebrands in winter with which to warm themselves, Diaz named the stream Rio del Tizon (Firebrand river), a name more distinctive than the present one, which often causes considerable confusion because no part of the river is in the state of Colorado.

THIS SOUNDS LIKE SENSE

The best estimates of the value of all Oregon crops of grain, fruit, fish, vegetables, livestock and dairy products for 1916 (at war prices) is placed at \$130,000,000.

In the grain districts and the livestock centers the farmers are mighty prosperous. But if some man came along and showed these farmers where they could get another \$100,000,000 added to the circulating medium in this state, would they take it? Foolish question number one.

That is exactly what is proposed by the North Pacific Coast Tourist Association. They intend to bring a crop of tourists to Oregon, Washington and British Columbia and to have those tourists drop \$100,000,000 every year in the laps of Oregon farmers, laborers and merchants.

If the association should get only 250,000,000 a year from tourists it would be more money than is brought into the state by wheat and cattle; it would about double the value of the combined fruit crops; it would be more money than Oregon gets for her potatoes, corn, barley, rye, oats and hay.

The tourist association has adopted the same plan, with improvements, that has been successful in getting the tourist to California and to Switzerland. They will combine the scenic attractions of the northwest and advertise them as one tour. It is intended to feature the summer climate of the northwest and to induce tourists to stay here for months, visiting every section of the state. That means that every community will secure its share of this new money, and that its resources will be looked over by men who are able to buy.
