

**INDUSTRIAL REVIEW**

Portland—Western Spar Co. has shipped 40 cargoes of booms to Moore Shipbuilding Co. at Oakland, Cal., to be used in United States ships and have a contract to furnish all their requirements.

Portland—Two Brothers just finished a cantonment at Riverside in record time—60 days.

Portland's population is 311,351, according to the estimate given by the 1915 city directory. The population last year was 287,000. This shows what industrial development does for a community.

Portland—Pacific Coast Steel Co. now operating plants at San Francisco, Seattle and Irondale, Wash., will begin at once erection here of a \$750,000 rolling mill and open hearth furnace. Will employ between 400 and 500 men and will have a payroll of \$50,000 or more a month.

Coquille—Work on C. A. Machon theatre to be rushed and improvements are being made at Johnson mill.

Toledo—Road between Toledo and Knab put in first class condition by grading.

Hood River—\$50,000 contract for grading Columbia Highway between here and Cascade locks awarded.

Pendleton—Dedication of Olney Abbey Mausoleum, one of the hand-somest community mausoleums in the United States, will take place here.

Molalla—Fire Clay Co. to manufacture dishes here in near future, early factory of kind west of Missis-sippi.

Burns—Rail extension urged. Harney county declared rich in war resources. Director General McAdoo promises to consider building of Oregon & Eastern into Burns.

Oregon is leading every section of the country in wooden ship construction and is near the top with steel.

Hood River may have a sorghum mill.

Vale—New nitrate company organized. Local men release nitrate deposits to Seattle capitalists.

Portland—Orders for an aggregate of 50,000,000 feet of Douglas fir lumber for use in railroad car construction and 2,000,000 feet for mill.

Dillard—Work commenced on two Pacific Highway bridges that will span Umpqua river at a point three-fourths of a mile north of here and two and one-half miles south. Structures will cost \$45,000.

**AMERICAN TEAMS TO TEACH BASEBALL**

A committee on public information representative in London says:

London has never heard of a baseball season before, but will get its chance this year when the American baseball league gets its schedule of games well under way. There are eight American and Canadian teams recruited from various organizations stationed in London, with games scheduled for each Saturday during the summer.

Thousands of American soldiers who may pass through London, or be invalided or stationed here, are in a fair way to be made to feel that England is the next best place to home, and that English hearts are kept warm for them.

"Make England the Sammy's 'blighty,'" is the way the English press puts it in urging readers to entertain the American troops.

"Blighty" is the war word for everything the soldier wants in intervals of his fighting work; the place where friends, recreation, and home-like comfort await him.

The Weekly Dispatch recently called for suggestions for a public entertainment to be offered American soldiers and an instant response made thousands of dollars available for amusements and entertainments. The idea that found greatest favor, however, was to throw open the homes of the nation to the Sammys.

An officer commanding an American squadron operating with the British fleet has reported on a late inspection and speaks in high terms of the present state of efficiency in which he finds both ships and men.

"Vessels show the most gratifying improvement in battery and fire control," he said. "Our ships are smart, spick, and span, and have been recipients of many high compliments from British flag officers."

**SPORT EQUIPMENT FOR TRAINING CAMPS**

At every training camp in the country plans of the commission on training camp activities have been carried out to provide athletic facilities for the men. Baseball heads the list in popularity, and full equipment has been placed in the camps. More than 70,000 baseballs and 3,000 bats have been sent. At Camp Lewis, Wash., there are 16 baseball fields in use. Practically every company in each camp division throughout the country has its team, and there are company, battalion, regimental and interregimental leagues.

Every form of track athletics occupies the attention of men training at the camps. As many as 800 men have taken part in divisional contests, and track meets have been witnessed by more than 20,000 spectators.

Where facilities permit, instruction in swimming is given. Men are first given land instruction and then sent into the water. Tennis courts have been built in every camp, one having 40 courts, and the sport is rapidly gaining in popularity. Through the generosity of golf clubs located near the camps, the demand for golf courses is partly being met. Polo matches are frequently held, and competition for places on the teams is keen.

**AMERICAN INFANTRY-MAN HAS ADVANTAGE**

The American infantryman in the Expeditionary Forces carried 200 rounds of ammunition in the pockets of his light canvas web belt and his bandoleers. The German soldier has only 120 rounds, and 30 of these are in his knapsack. To secure them at a critical moment he must lose valuable time.

The American web belts, according to the war department, are far superior to the German leather bandoleers. They are not affected by prolonged rains nor torrid weather. The manufacture of these belts is one of the most intricate of the operations in the textile field. United States army belts are made almost entirely of cotton.

The exact weight of the 220 rounds carried by the American soldier in France is 12 pounds. With the Springfield rifle 23 aimed shots can be fired each minute. Firing from the hip 40 shots can be fired a minute. The new United States model 1917 (modified Enfield) does even better.
