**Portland**—The new record of \$13.15 for hogs at North Portland is something to make Oregonians proud. Long live the red-haired hog.

**Marshfield**—Bandon woolen mill has been purchased by E. N. Smith, who contemplates an increase in capacity and addition of new machinery sufficient to employ 60 people and manufacture wider range of woollens.

**Benton and Lane counties** have the creek roads of the state.

**Gardner**—Farming and dairying are rapidly growing industries along lower Umpqua.

**Lebanon** may get new flouring mill.

**Roseburg**—The Roseburg Cannery expects to can 35,000 cases of beans. Following the bean crop tomatoes, pears and prunes will be handled.

**Eugene**—Entire prune crop of valley is sold. Growers will receive maximum price when fruit is harvested in September.

**Silverton**—New canning factory for Silverton seems very probable.

**Eugene**—Hops sold at 20 cents. 18,800 pounds to be delivered Oct. 15.

**Scio**—Scio milk condenser installs ice plant—may supply city.

**Silverton** to have a new hospital.

**Oregon City**—River road between Gladstone and Milwaukee closed for several weeks, opened for travel.

**Reedsport**—Reedsport Lumber Co., properties including mill and about 20,000,000 feet of standing fir and spruce purchased by J. I. Jones and R. A. Annin.

**Tillamook**—450 sacks sphagnum moss gathered at Tillamook City. This is considered the best region in the state for this moss.

**Salem**—Oregon Short Line pays \$2,000,000 in dividends in 1917.

**Toledo**—H. S. Gile, Salem, making arrangements to purchase Lincoln County's evergreen blackberry crop. Will pay 5 cents per pound.

**Oregon** produced \$2,270,874 worth of gold, silver and copper, of which Baker county produced \$1,689,601 worth, copper being the largest in value.


