
Tuberculin Tests Made

Gardner, deputy state veterinarian during the past week, conducted tuberculin tests on more than one hundred of cattle. Practically all supplying milk to the city were given the test and reactors were found.

State law requires all herds from which milk is sold for consumption to be tuberculin tested once each year. This is a vital step toward the public health and the consumer is entitled to this protection.
