EVANGELICAL MEETING.

VERNONIA, Or., Sept. 6th, 1892. The third annual camping-out of the Evangelical church was held in the beautiful grove on the banks of Rock creek, commencing August 26th, and lasting ten days.

Rev. W. L. Bittner, Presiding Elder of the Portland district, M. Burlingame, of La Fayette, T. T. Vincent, Winlock, Wash., R. D. Streyfeler, Vernonia, and Prof. Frank Streyfeler, teacher of vocal and instrumental music, of Portland, were present and ably assisted in the services.

The people of Vernonia deserve special mention for the good attendance, attention and behavior, upon and about the camp grounds. We believe the Nehalem valley in the near future will be one of the most desirable portions of Columbia county for prospective settlers.

WHEREAS, By the direction of Providence and the call of the people of Nehalem valley, Rev. L. S. Fisher and M. Burlingame, assisted by Brother F. Streyfeler in song service, began an Evangelical camping-out near Vernonia, August 20, 1892, there being but two tents on the ground, but the meeting was wonderfully owned and blessed by God, and

WHEREAS, One year ago, beginning on the 20th of August, 1891, the second camping-out commenced, there being five tents on the ground and three ministers present, viz: H. I. Bittner, M. Burlingame and N. Shupp, with increasing attendance and attention on the part of the people. And

WHEREAS, This year the third camping-out was held, beginning August 26th, 1892, and continuing ten days; there being thirteen camps or tents on the ground, and four ministers present, viz: H. I. Bittner, M. Burlingame, T. T. Vincent, and R. D. Streyfeler, assisted in the song service by F. Streyfeler, of Portland. And

WHEREAS, Brother J. VanBlaricom, moved by Providence, deeded about two acres of ground in the bend of Rock creek, within the limits of the town of Vernonia, for a permanent camping-out ground to the Evangelical Association. And

WHEREAS, The people of the valley, irrespective of denominational names, have kindly assisted in clearing and beautifying the camp ground. There fore be it

WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From our regular correspondent.) Washington, September 2, 1892. Republicans certainly have every reason to feel satisfied with the political news brought to Washington from every section, by level-headed men who know whereof they speak.

Senator Hiscock, of New York, who is in Washington this week, was disposed to be jubilant over the outlook in that important state. "Everything is coming our way," said he; "there are no weak places in the republican line of battle, and the tariff issue, which the annual report of the state commissioner of labor has brought so prominently forward, will cause thousands of democratic workmen to vote for Harrison and Reid. Yes, sir; New York is all right."

Judge Cronmeyer, the republican candidate for governor of Nebraska, returned to Washington this week to close up his official duties as assistant secretary of the treasury, preparatory to resigning and devoting all of his time to the campaign. He says: "The Nebraska republicans have entered this fight to win. Two years ago, owing to two successive failures of crops—something unprecedented in the state—and the consequent feeling of discontent, Nebraska fell largely into the alliance movement, a consequence of which is, that our state, which has always been so strong a republican, is today misrepresented in congress. This state of affairs we propose to change. The alliance party is making no gains; on the contrary many of its members are returning to the republican party, some of them having participated in the late republican caucuses and conventions. The conditions have all changed. Two good crops in succession have put our people in the happy frame of mind which full crops and granaries usually bring. More and better campaign work will be done by the republicans this year than ever before, and you may confidently expect a republican victory, in November, in Nebraska."

Venezuela may feel the heavy hand of Uncle Sam before long, as it is understood that the commander of the United States gunboat Concord, which has been ordered to Venezuelan waters, carries instructions to make a peremptory demand upon the authorities of Venezuela for the return of the political refugees who were recently taken by force from a passenger steamship flying the American flag. If investigation shall show that the published account of that occurrence was correct, this admission of the American flag to be protected.

It was reported here a day or two ago that the president was contemplating calling an extra session of congress for the purpose of passing a law prohibiting all immigration during the prevalence of cholera in Europe. No official confirmation of the rumor can be obtained, although the president's return to Washington causes it to find many believers.
