

LOCAL

Sam Summers was found guilty in the Circuit court last Monday of burglarizing the depot at Clatskanie in January last. It took the jury less than five minutes to arrive at a decision. It will be remembered that Summers' confederate informed the authorities that he intended to rob the depot and they lay in wait for him and caught him in the act. In attempting to escape he was shot by one of the deputies. Summers is a man in the fifties and evidently belongs to the class whom it would be best to confine in the penitentiary for life, as they have no intention of earning an honest living and while at large are a menace to life and property. He was sentenced Wednesday to three years in the penitentiary.

The steam schooner Casco, of the McCormick line, left the dock of the St. Helens Mill Company on Sunday last with a full cargo of lumber for California, and the Strathtay cleared on Tuesday with about 3,200,000 on board. Over two million of this was taken from the mill here and the rest was taken out at Knappa and some California ports. The California portion of the cargo consists of redwood. The Yellowstone, another boat of the McCormick line, is now at the docks taking on a cargo for California. The British steamer St. Dunstan will arrive about the 20th and take about one million and a half for Melbourne. The Strathtay's cargo also goes to Australian ports—part to Sydney and part to Fremantle.

The City Council held its regular meeting in the Abstract Company's office last Monday, very little business being transacted beside allowing a few small bills. A lease was granted to Charles Bergerson for a term of one year to quarry blocks in Union Square, and the City Attorney instructed to draw it up. Mr. Bergerson furnishes a bond in the sum of \$500 to cover any damage he may do by blasting. This quarry has developed into quite a source of income, as the city is now getting about a dollar a day for the use of it. Besides this the spalls are the property of the city and will save a lot of expense when we need more rock on the streets.

Mr. Ishler has begun the erection of an addition to the Oreadia Hotel, as business is so brisk here that the present hotel accommodations are often crowded to the limit, and we are pretty well supplied with stopping places at that.

The tree refutes the story of Colonel Dosh and others that the fruit of walnut seedlings continues to decrease in size until it becomes so small to be of any value, for the present crop of the old tree will be as large and apparently as plentiful as any it has borne.

THE BITER BITTEN

A Real Estate Company Claims to Have Been Deceived by L. S. Thomas.

Parker Steenick, recently of Rainier, has brought suit against the Lemcke Company, now the Sharkey Company, for \$4,500 a note and mortgage dated January 6, 1907, and the defendant company in its answer avers there is nothing due the said Parker Steenick, for the reason that the said note and mortgage were procured by fraud, without valuable consideration; and the third allegation of the answer specifies the fraud alleged in part as follows:

"On or about January 12, 1907, the plaintiff and the defendant Thomas approached these defendants and represented to them that they had examined a tract of water frontage land on the Columbia River at Rainier, and that said land was very valuable. That various parties were endeavoring to purchase the same; that the tideland adjoining and abutting said lands extended along the whole distance of said four thousand feet more than four hundred feet from the upland shore of the Columbia river to the low water mark of said river; that the plaintiff and defendant Thomas had, a short time prior thereto, purchased twelve hundred feet of said land and of the same character, for the sum of twelve thousand dollars; that they had a contract of sale to an English syndicate for the sum of thirty-five thousand dollars; that said English syndicate had already bought a large timber tract directly back of said land and was about to erect large docks and lumber mills; that a large and wealthy New York firm had become interested in property at Rainier and would be obliged to buy a large amount of river frontage there; that defendant Thomas was in touch with some shipbuilding concerns that were then looking for sites along the water front at Rainier; that a large wholesale fruit and grocery firm at St. Paul, Minnesota, had purchased twelve thousand acres of land directly back of said land and were going to develop said twelve thousand acres into fruit lands, and that they would require a large amount of said river frontage for docks, wharves and warehouses; that the Northern Pacific Railway Company had already made application to the Federal War Department for the building of a large bridge across the Columbia river just near the end of said land, and that said railroad company would require part of said land for terminal facilities, docks and warehouses; that said railroad company had already gotten out plans and specifications for the erection of west elevators at Rainier; that the Oakland Ship Building Company were then looking for a site along said water frontage near said land; that a large steel corporation with which defendant Thomas was in touch had decided to locate its plant at Rainier; that large coal and iron deposits had recently been discovered directly back of said lands, and that the owners of said coal and iron deposits would require a large part of this land for the erection of docks, wharves, and coal bunkers;" and so on.

Defendant Thomas failed to appear and answer, and the court decreed that his one quarter interest in said land be set aside and the title to the same confirmed to the H. W. Lemcke Co., now the John W. Sharkey Co.
