Local dealers still anticipate a slight advance within a short time, but just what they base their expectation upon they do not say. We give the quotations at different points as follows: San Francisco, 14@16c; Pacifics in New York, 10@18c; Liverpool, dull and unchanged.

AT KENT, KING COUNVY.—The White River Journal of April 28 said: Hop training has been quite general during the past week until the rain on Thursday put a stop to all work in the fields. L. A. Dow began training on Thursday, but at noon he concluded the plants were too small to train successfully. The field hands were all sent home, and no more work will be done until the first of next week. The Meeker ranches seem to be as well advanced as any in the valley, and the work of training was begun on Tues-

day and continued until prevented by the rain on Thursday. The wages paid for training by most of the growers are \$1 per day, but Mr. Meeker is only paying 75 cents per day.
