RIVERTON'S JERSEYS.


Riverton Farm is located charmingly in the suburbs of Spokane, on the bank of the beautiful river from which the city takes its name. The writer was a guest at Riverton farm a few weeks ago and had an opportunity to inspect the herd of finely-bred animals of which Dilworth Brothers are so justly proud.

It was a pleasure to look over the collection, representing some of as fine dairy types as may be found in the Northwest. The photo-engraving on this page is of the head of the herd and represents an animal of remarkable breeding. Scribe 22373 is a son of Diploma 16219, sire of 33 tested cows making over 14 lbs. butter in seven days, including Merry Maiden, champion cow of all three tests combined against all breeds, World's Fair Dairy Tests. Diploma was sired by Combination 4389, sire of 25 tested cows. Scribe's dam was Beauty of Cloverside 18608, who was also grand-

ancestry counts for anything they should leave some good calves in Riverton herd.

Model Girl, 97409, is a solid light fawn cow bred in Tennessee, a daughter of Fancy's Pogis, No. 21797, sire of Muzio, 97424, (test 15 lbs. 2 oz.) and several other tested cows. Model Girl gave 34 lbs. of milk per day last winter, which tested 5 per cent. fat on dry feed with no grain but bran and shorts.

Farmia's Pogisina, No. 97406, is five years old, a medium-sized cow with splendid constitution, was bred in Tennessee, and like many of the Tennessee-bred cattle, has some white marks; she is a very persistent milker, as shown by the fact that three months before dropping her last calf she was giving 24 lbs. of milk daily, that tested 6 per cent. butter fat. Her milk veins, udder and teats are all good. Sire, Fancy's Pogis, No. 21797, sire of several tested cows, he being a son of Landseer's Pogis, No. 15847, with 31 tested daughters.

dam of the famous Brown Bessie 74997, winner of the 30 and 90 day tests, World's Fair, Chicago, 1893.

An understanding of the powers of transmission of this animal may best be obtained by explaining that Dilworth Bros. have two daughters of Scribe in milk—both from very ordinary cows that at maturity did not give to exceed three gallons per day when fresh. These two heifers came in a little under two years of age and have given from 20 to 24 lbs. per day.

Next in importance in the herd is New York's Albert Pogis, 45215, a year and a half old bull, a son of Ida of St. Lambert's Butter Bull, 36052 who won prizes at New York state fair in 1896 and 1897. Several of his calves have taken prizes at New York state fairs and also at the Live Stock Show of America held at Madison Square Garden, New York City. This great animal is world-famed for his record as a sire, and has no less than nine daughters who have tested over 14 lbs. of butter each in seven days. The dam of New York's Albert Pogis is Lady Albert Europus, No. 31861, a 16 lb. cow and daughter of Ramapo, No. 4679, sire of several tested daughters and also winner of first prize and gold medal, New York state fair. For many years he stood at the head of the famous Houghton Farm herd while under the management of Major Alvord. Lady Albert Europus' dam was Frankie 3rd, 781, full sister to Albert 44, who has probably as many tested descendants as any Jersey bull.

Both of the above bulls are individually good and if good

Biscuit Pogis, No. 97419, is another beautiful daughter of Fancy's Pogis, 21797; is a small cow, and the description of Farmia's Pogisina will fit Biscuit very closely. She is giving now on very poor pasture over 30 lbs. of rich milk per day; was fresh August 8th, when she dropped a beautiful, solid-colored bull calf that is hard to beat anywhere.

Fairy's Joy, No. 94686, is a medium-sized cow, solid fawn color, with beautiful head, finely formed, square udder and good teats. Fairy's Joy when fresh milks about 30 lbs. daily and is a first-class dairy cow; her sire is Prince of Tennessee, No. 20772, with ten daughters testing from 15 lbs. 4 oz. to 24 lbs. 4½ oz. Prince is without doubt the best son of the great Southern Prince.

Cream of Spokane, 108058, is a very small 2-year-old cow, daughter of Maury's Tormentor, 25113, a son of Tormentor, 3555; (38 tested daughters) and Southern Daisy, 38292, also tested; dam of Cream is Selita's Cream, 50647, daughter of Selita J., 32184 (with butter record of 25 lbs. 2½ oz. in seven days). Cream will make a very rich cow when matured, as she gave 18 lbs. of milk per day, testing 7½ per cent. fat last winter on dry feed. Her skin is very yellow and hair very fine and short. She is a Jersey with horns to tail.

Koliander 2nd, 108059, is another good one—two years old, very dark grey and being a granddaughter of Fancy's Harry, 9777, sire of 27 cows in 14 lbs. list, she should be good.
