\$3,053 High School and Building Aid Received

FOR SCHOOLS OF ANDERSON COUNTY ENTITLED TO RECEIVE SAME

THIS COUNTY LEADS STATE

Has More High Schools and Gets More State High School Aid.

County Superintendent of Education J. B. Felton was notified yesterday that the sum of \$3,053 of State high school and building aid money had been forwarded to the treasurer of Anderson County to be divided among the schools of this county entitled to receive it.

Funds received by high schools out of this appropriation are as follows:

Total \$800
Under this law where schools build new houses they receive aid for the State to the amount of 1-4 of the cost of the structure up to \$1,200. A similar amount is given by the county board of education of each county.

In order to share in the high school aid fund, schools have to run for a certain length of time, employ so many teachers and comply with other requirements of the high school law. No town of more than 2,500 inhabitants is eligible to share in this fund. Mr. Felton stated yesterday that he expects to get between \$16,000 and \$17,000 of State money this year for the schools of Anderson County. A few days ago he received from the State contingent fund the sum of \$3,500. Prior to that he received of the rural graded school fund the sum of \$7,700. Last fall he received \$2,000 of term extension money, and also received about \$1,000 of the first division of high school money. He expects to receive yet about \$1,000 of State money for the schools of this county.

It is gratifying to know that Anderson County leads all other counties of the State in the number of high schools, and also receives more State high school aid than any other county of the State, getting the maximum amount of \$3,000.

J. E. SWEARINGEN IS COMING NEXT WEEK

WILL SPEAK AT HIGH SCHOOL CLOSING EXERCISES

TOUR COUNTY

State Superintendent of Education Will Speak to Patrons of Various Communities.

State Superintendent of Education J. E. Swearingen will arrive in Anderson next Sunday night for the purpose of delivering an address at the commencement exercises of the city high school Monday evening and spending half of the week visiting school communities of the county.

He is, of course, coming too late to visit any of the schools, as all of them have closed for the summer. He will, however, meet with the patrons of the various school communities in several quarters of the county by going to some church, school house or town and there speaking to patrons of several surrounding school districts.

Itinerary Monday.

In company with County Superintendent of Education, Mr. Swearingen will leave the city early Monday morning. At Mt. Bethel church, at 10:30 o'clock, he will meet with the patrons of some five schools and address them on some pertinent subject.

At 3:30 o'clock that afternoon he will be at Carswell institute, where he will meet with the patrons of some four schools and address them along similar lines.

Monday evening he will return to the city and deliver the address at the commencement exercises of the high school.

Itinerary Tuesday.

Tuesday morning at 10:30 o'clock Mr. Swearingen will meet with the patrons of the Townville school.

At 3:30 o'clock of the same afternoon he will be at Zion school house, where he will deliver an address.

Tuesday night at 8 o'clock he will meet with the patrons of the Lebanon school.

Wednesday's Program.

At 9 o'clock Wednesday morning Mr. Swearingen will be at Welcome school, where he is scheduled to deliver an address.

At 10:30 o'clock he will speak at White Plains school.

From 1 to 3 o'clock of the same afternoon he will visit the schools at Pelzer.

At 4 o'clock that afternoon he will address the school patrons of West Pelzer.

He will take the Southern railway train at Pelzer that afternoon, and return to Columbia.
