WILL LOWER GRADE ON NORTH MAIN ST.

INCLINE BETWEEN EARLE AND SHARPE STREETS TO BE TAKEN OFF

BIG IMPROVEMENT

Starting With Lowering of 8 Inches in Front Evans Block of Stores.

Meeting yesterday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock in regular monthly session, in the council chamber at the city hall, the city fathers transacted a considerable amount of business, a goodly portion of which was of unusual importance.

One of the principal matters transacted was the adoption of a resolution to carry out the request contained in a petition from property owners on North Main street, between Earle and Sharpe streets, to lower the grade of North Main street between the cross streets named. The starting point of this work will be in front of the J. M. Evans building, of the quarters of the Southern Express company, where the grade will be lowered 8 inches. The balance of the street from there down to Earle street will be lowered in proportion, which means that the steep incline on North Main street, about where Orr street crosses, will be almost obliterated.

According to the plans of the street paving commission, North Main street, between Earle and Sharpe streets, was to be lowered considerably less than will be the case under the plan adopted yesterday afternoon by council. The paving commission was to lower the east side of the street to a depth of 18 inches in front of the property of Mrs. Jane Todd, making the remainder of the street correspond. Just how much lower the new plan will make the street in that vicinity, is not definitely known.

It is believed that the lowering of the grade on North Main street, between Earle and Sharpe streets, will add materially to the general appearance of the thoroughfare, especially after it is paved.

REFUSE PETITION TO ERECT GARAGE

PROPERTY OWNERS OBJECT TO ONE IN REAR OF MAXWELL BUILDING

COUNCIL MATTERS

Various Other Items of Interest and Importance Were Taken to Stop Practice.

Aside from the several matters of special importance transacted by city council, in regular monthly session yesterday afternoon, there were a number of matters of minor nature, but nevertheless interesting, given attention.

One of these matters was a request from J. D. Maxwell for permission to erect a garage, or building for a similar purpose, in the rear of the Maxwell Building on the west side of the square. This matter was referred to the building committee for investigation and recommendation, but the committee reported yesterday that inasmuch as it considered this a very important matter they would prefer council as a whole passing on it.

Members of the committee reported, however, that adjacent property owners objected vigorously to the garage being erected on the site named. One member of the committee stated that an insurance agent had informed him that if the building was erected on that vicinity the policies on all property on that side of the square would be immediately cancelled, and that insurance rates in that quarter would be at least doubled. After a discussion pro and con council decided to refuse the petition for permission to erect the building.

A petition for a light between the Blue Ridge Railway crossing on East Whitner street and Jefferson avenue was referred to the committee on water and lights.

Upon request of Alderman Tate, council authorized the city engineer to install sewer lines on Browne and Monroe streets at the same time sewer work is going on in that section of the city.

A petition for the laying curb and drain and a cement sidewalk on that portion of D street immediately in front of the Second Baptist church was granted.

Council, upon the mayor's request, revoked its former action in granting Mayor Godfrey authority to grant a license to Dr. Nanzetta to sell medicines in the city.

SOUTHERN RAILWAY HAS BROUGHT SUITS

INVOLVES COTTON OIL MILLS AT BELTON AND ONE AT PELZER

DAMAGES \$800.00

Attorneys Engaged and Case Will be Tried at Approaching Term of Court.

The Southern Railway has brought suits against the Broadway Cotton Oil mill of Belton and the Wilmot Oil mill of Pelzer, the case arising from shipments of cotton seed made by these concerns to North Carolina points. Damages of about \$400 in the case of each mill is asked.

It is claimed by the railroad that shipments during the year 1913-14 to points in North Carolina were made on a rate based on information given at the railway offices in Pelzer and Belton and that these shipments were sold by the mills along these points at a price graduated by these rates. It is now claimed by the railroad that the rate was lower than the law allows and that they have lost by the deal with these mills. As the cotton seed was sold at the points to which shipments were made by a price which was regulated by this rate, the mills claiming that they are not to blame and their prices were made by the rates furnished by the railroads.

The case will very probably come up at the next term of the court of common pleas in Anderson. Messrs. Bonham, Watkins, and Allen will represent the Broadway mill and Mr. Frank Watkins, of Watkins and Prince will represent the Wilmot mill.
