MANY RESPONDED TO FIRST INVITATION

SIXTY-FIVE PERSONS PROFFESSED CONVERSION LAST NIGHT.

INTEREST GROWING

Tent Was Again Crowded and the Evangelist Says Better Than Expected.

Last night, for the first time since the meeting has started here, Rev. B. F. McLendon called for converts, and 65 rushed down the aisle to grasp his hand. He stated last night that this was far more than he had expected and that everything pointed to a great meeting in Anderson.

The subject of the sermon last night was "Repentance," and is in substance as follows:

"We very seldom hear a sermon on repentance today. Plenty of preachers in a long ministry never preached one single sermon on repentance. They have preached on everything else, but have given repentance a wide berth. Probably for the same reason that the colored preacher never liked to preach against stealing chickens, because it always appeared to throw such a coldness over the meeting, and made so many of his members freeze up towards him. No matter who preaches on repentance he is bound to stir up a den of snakes. Sam Jones never said anything truer than when he said, 'When you throw a rock into a gang of dogs the hit dog will holler.'

"Of all things that we hate more than anything else, is to see ourselves as we really are. We hate that which shows up our faults and blemishes. That is one reason so many people do not like my plain preaching. No photographer would make a living taking pictures if he made a correct likeness of everybody who came to him. If he did not retouch the negative and take out the ugly spots, the woman with a squint and the man with a red wart on his nose would go elsewhere for pictures. It is said that an elephant will not drink water out of a clear stream for when he sees his ugly face reflecting in it he is stirred to fury and lashes the water into foam. There must be a good deal of human nature about an elephant or a lot of elephant about human nature. This is the reason why so many people do not like the Bible; it makes them see their own wicked, devilish hearts. People do not like preaching that goes after their rough shod. They want the 'you tickle me, I tickle you' kind. Preaching that stabs them on the head and calls them Mary's little lamb. Make a man certain that the Lord admires him and you will be a great preacher to him.

"I am ashamed that I ever got low enough down to fight game chickens, 'cause it is the dirtiest, cruelest sport that I know of today, but I learned one lesson. You can take a chicken and he will have all the appearance of the game and he will fight till he dies with his natural heels, but put the steel to him and he can not get away fast enough.

"I have put the gospel steel to some of these criticizing Anderson knockers, and the old feather-legged dung-hills have gone to the tall timbers. If you preach on repentance, you will sure find out there is a devil. It has always been unpopular and always will be unpopular, but God commands it, urges it, enforces it, repeats and drives it in everywhere. For every one sermon you hear preached in our churches today on repentance, you will hear twenty on the love of God. And some of you have been preached to on love so much you are nauseated on the love 'I. Am afraid we preachers in our zeal and enthusiasm to eat people into the church, have lowered the bars, we have widened the doors, but not God's doors. 'To multitudes of people nowadays it costs nothing to come into the church and it costs nothing to go out. They give up nothing when they come in and leave nothing behind when they go out. Back yonder in the years ago, it meant something to come to Christ, it was a pilgrimage, it was a warfare, it was a conflict, a struggle, it meant an honest attempt to do the will of God. We have heard something about self-denial and taking up your cross, it meant being willing to be a fool for Christ's sake, it meant coming out and being forsaken, slandered and despised, persecuted and stigmatized and ostracized. What does it mean now? It means a card sign, head nodding, eye blinking, trumpet up, sentimental, mechanical, perfunctory, whooped in, social entertainment and with multitudes of people who call themselves Christians. It means nothing more.

"Thank God, Jesus never deluded anybody. He never cried peace when there was no peace, peace while the soul is in anarchy, peace while the heart was in rebellion, peace while God was being defiled, peace while He had dethroned the Infinite, peace and the whole man against God. No, you will never have peace until you surrender and quit your meanness and come to God through the atoning blood of Jesus Christ.

"I am afraid that we have been going ahead of God and counting heads instead of hearts. One-half of the so-called backsliders never know God, and they never front-slid. And one of the reasons why we have got such a sickly, sentimental, perfunctory crop of so-called believers in the churches who can get up enthusiasm for a fancy affair or theater, but are not there when there is a prayer meeting and they are conscious by their absence, when Christianizing evangelization is on hand, is because they were not born right. They skipped the main business.

"John preached repentance. He came to preach it. It had the first place in his sermons. No man that preaches as John did will be popular. Every gospel preacher like John is to be a messenger. He is not to originate the message, but simply to give it as God gives it to him. He has no right to modify it to suit people's wicked notions or soothe their wicked hearts. There was no more flinch in John's preaching than there was in a Quaker meeting. His message was, 'Prepare ye the way of the Lord.' He took dead aim at the fellow on the front seat.

"If John had been like a lot of preachers, old lecturer Herol would have been happy every time he heard him preach. Why, he would have catered to get his vanity in his very prayers by thanking God that he had placed over them such a wise and virtuous king. One who knew what religion was and had a dull portion of it himself."

Several hands are engaged there now and the work will go right ahead. Dr. Jenkins will occupy one of the store rooms, using it as a drug store as formerly.
