

DR. VINES WELCOMED TO ROANOKE CHURCH

WARM RECEPTION GIVEN HIM ON JUNE 8.—DR. VINES' RESPONSE.
HE DID HIS DUTY
Tells People of Roanoke That in Leaving Anderson He Thinks He Did Proper Thing.

In the Roanoke Times, issue of June 8, appears a picture of the Rev. John P. Vines and an article of his installation as pastor of the First Baptist church of that city.
In the article the names of five men are given who welcomed Dr. Vines to his new charge. One was in behalf of the other denominations in the city, and for the congregation of the First Baptist church, one from Calvary Baptist church, one in behalf of the Valley Baptist association and one in behalf of the Roanoke Y. M. C. A.
Dr. Vines then made his response in which he stated how he would like to express to each one who had addressed him what he felt in his heart. He told the congregation that the severance of ties which had been strengthened by long association was a trial and he could not help but feel the sadness of parting of old friends. The warm welcome had given him such feeling of hope and companionship, and love as to make it a happy occasion indeed.
As a prelude to his first sermon the Times states that Dr. Vines reiterated the statement he made here in Anderson to his congregation who he told them that he felt he had fulfilled his mission here, and thought his duty to depart as soon as he could, or that rest on his feet and we are the younger group will make him. He stated that as thought it best that a minister thus should leave his accomplished work before the congregation went him to leave.
The Roanoke paper devoted about three columns to the article and appears that Dr. Vines was warmly welcomed in his new field.
A sermon preached at dusk from Matthew 13:44 by the church spirit was the striking feature of a campaign for attracting a record-breaking audience at the evening Master service at a church in St. Louis as shown by an illustration in the July Popular Mechanics Magazine.
