REGULAR MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL

WAS HELD YESTERDAY AND MAJORITY ROUTINE BUSINESS TRANSACTED.

MUST HAVE PERMIT

People in City Have Been Careless About Getting Permit to Erect Buildings.

The regular monthly meeting of city council was held yesterday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, there being nothing of any importance before the body except that of routine business, such as hearing and granting petitions, etc.

One of the main questions that came up was that of extending the fire limits. It was stated that since the business district was spreading out, these limits ought to be extended. This was referred to the fire committee which will report at the next meeting.

Building Permits. The attention of council was also called to the matter of granting permits for buildings in the city. It was shown that many people began the construction of houses and little shacks before getting their permit and that in many cases these would not have been granted had the buildings already been half constructed. It was decided that in the future when a permit was wanted, the proper application blanks must be filled out before the building is started and that they must be signed by the building committee of city council. In this way it will relieve the city engineer of the responsibility and will probably prevent some objectionable houses being partly constructed before a permit is asked for.

Several resolutions and affidavits were read by Mr. E. F. Cochran, the city attorney, these being approved in order to complete the records in the clerk's office in connection with the street paving.

Messrs. W. L. Brissey, E. H. Richards and J. L. Gray appeared before council and asked that the street from the Blue Ridge railway tracks to East Orr street be paved with Belgium blocks. This petition was granted with the understanding that this work be done after that already passed on by council.

A representative of the J. I. Case Threshing company was present to attend to the collection of a note amounting to approximately \$900, which is due in balance payment of the steam roller and grader bought for the city about two years ago. It appears that this machinery has not been giving the service it ought to have and the city is trying to make some satisfactory arrangement about this before making the final payment.

GEN. DIAZ, EX-PRES. OF MEXICO EXPIRES IN FRANCE

The views General Diaz held of these subsequent happenings were reported mainly by rumor. He authorized but few interviews, and those in the main were those of an old man grieved over his own misfortunes and those of Mexico. He longed to see peace reestablished, and was often quoted as having urged the now former President Huerta to quit to prevent a foreign war. He was repeatedly reported on the point of returning to Mexico, but he denied that he ever would, unless Mexico was drawn into war with the United States, or unless it was for him to die in his native land.

General Diaz was born in 1830. His family were of old Spanish stock with an infusion of Indian blood. Left fatherless at the age of three, he was educated at the expense of the Bishop of Oaxaca with the intention of becoming a priest, but he eventually turned to law and then at the outbreak of the war with the United States turned to a military career. He served throughout that struggle in a militia company which he helped organize, and after peace was declared he made a special study of military science. He and one other were the only two in the country who dared openly oppose the continuation of Santa Anna's dictatorship. His execution was ordered, but he escaped and joined Herrera's revolt. He speedily made a reputation as a soldier, and as a brigadier-general he was the chief thorn in the side of the French forces, when, taking advantage of the Civil War in the United States, they attempted to place Archduke Maximilian of Austria on the throne of a Mexican empire. Diaz harassed the enemy constantly, and in June, 1867, captured Mexico City with his forces. On the reestablishment of the republic he was unsuccessful as a candidate for president, but in 1877 he was elected to fill the unexpired term of the fugitive president, Lerdo. His last and eighth election was in July, 1910.

To Diaz was given credit for the advance of Mexico to the status of a stable, progressive and prosperous government, although the autocratic methods he employed were widely criticized.
