## COMMISSION OFFERS \$19,500 WORTH BONDS

WILL USE PROCEEDS TO DRAIN ROCKY RIVER LANDS, DISTRICT NO. 1

GOOD PROPOSITION

Bonds Will Bear Interest at Rate of Six Per Cent Semi-Annual—Funds Are Sufficient.

Bids for \$19,500 of bonds have been advertised for by the Drainage commission of Rocky River drainage districts No. 1, the bonds to be issued for the purpose of draining the lands of Rocky river in said district.

Mr. Wade A. Sanders, engineer of the commission, estimates that this sum will be sufficient to do the work. The bonds are issued under the statute law of the state and will doubtless prove a good investment.

The bonds run for a period of 25 years and will bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, which will be payable semi-annually.

These bonds ought to be a paying proposition and the value of the enhancement can scarcely be estimated. Someone has estimated that if the land on Rocky River from the steel bridge up to Beale's bridge were drained and put in cultivation they would produce enough corn to supply the people of Anderson county.

The commission which is composed of L. G. Ballentine, J. J. Fretwell and F. S. Ligon have proceeded with great caution, and they feel that the work, when completed, will prove of great benefit to those whose lands are drained, and to the public at large.
