## YESTERDAY LAST DAY MAKING ARRANGEMENTS

TO PAY PAVING ASSES-  
MENTS 10 INSTALLMENT  
PLAN

TO HOLD MEETING

Street Paving Commission to Meet  
to Determine Amount of the  
Certificates.

Yesterday was the last day in which the owners of property abutting on the streets to be improved could elect the 10 installment plan in paying for their share of the cost of the paving. About 30 days ago the city clerk mailed out notices to each property owner affected, advising him of the amount of the assessments, and enclosed a written statement to the effect that the owners so receiving the statements must take written application (form enclosed) if they desired to pay their assessments in installments. It was pointed out in the notices that in the absence of any written request the assessments would have to be paid in one sum, and be paid at once. Many property owners expressed their desire and intention of paying their assessments in full, preferring this to the 10 installment plan. Others who probably intend to take advantage of the installment plan, failed to notify the city clerk as required by the ordinances. The failure on their part to make written application will cause these property owners some inconvenience. The matter is probably closed now, for the street paving commission will meet today or tomorrow to determine the amount of paving certificates to be placed. It was necessary to wait until the property owners were given 30 days to elect their modes of payments before the amount of paving certificates could be determined. The issue will be placed with the purchasers, Sidney Spitzer and company, Toledo, O., in the next few days, and the deferred part of the cost to be borne by the abutting property owners will become available therefrom.


