### SESSIONS COURT MAY ADJOURN DURING DAY

ONLY FEW MORE CASES TO BE TRIED AT THIS TERM

### CASES YESTERDAY

Three Were Tried and Testimony in Fourth Taken When Court Adjourned at 6 O'clock.

Solicitor K. P. Smith stated yesterday afternoon that he thought all cases to be tried at this term of court would be finished some time during this afternoon and that sessions court would adjourn sine die.

This session has been marked by the rapidity with which the cases have been disposed of and also since a number of defendants have entered pleas of guilty, this has enabled the docket to be cleared.

Yesterday morning the first case tried was that of the state versus W. L. Hubbard, indicted for violation of the dispensary law. There were two charges the first being with selling liquor and the other that of storing more than a gallon a month. He was found not guilty on the first count and guilty on the latter.

The defendant in the above case was represented by Mr. H. H. Dagnall while the solicitor did the prosecuting. It is the law that if any argument is to be made in reference to the constitutionality of an act under which anyone is to be tried, it must be done before the jurors are sworn. Accordingly yesterday morning Mr. Dagnall argued that the gallon-a-month law is unconstitutional because it is discriminatory. Solicitor Smith argued that the law is constitutional, and Judge Moore ruled that it is. Then the jurors were sworn.

The next case taken up was that of W. N. Kelly, indicted for obtaining goods under false pretenses. A verdict of not guilty was returned in this case.

Manly League plead guilty to house-breaking and larceny and was sentenced to six months at hard labor. Late yesterday afternoon the case of Henry Walker, indicted for house-breaking and larceny, was begun and when court adjourned at 6 o'clock all the testimony had been taken.

### AFTER AIKEN'S SEAT

Announcement of Candidate For Congress in 1916.

Columbia, S. C., Sept. 13.—Fred H. Dominick, assistant attorney general, authorized the statement today that he is a candidate for congress from the third district and will make the race for the Democratic nomination next summer in the primary. Congressman Wyatt Aiken, who has served the third district several terms, will undoubtedly run for reelection. It is thought that there may be other candidates in the race and that a warm fight is in progress for the Democratic nomination in the third in 1916.

### CAUSE OF ACCIDENT TO SUBMARINE F-4 UNKNOWN

Honolulu, Sept. 14.—Rear Admiral Clifford Joseph Bousch, commandant of the Honolulu naval station, announced today that although available data obtained by the examination of the hulk of the submarine F-4 was in his possession, he was unable to tell the cause of the disaster which sent the undersea craft to the bottom here March, costing 22 lives.

The board of inquiry appointed to conduct the examination began its final survey today of the battered shell.

### MORE COTTON WAS USED THAN IN LAST AUGUST

Washington, Sept. 14.—The cotton used during August, amounted to 464,486 bales exclusive of linters, as compared with 383,650 in August of last year.

### Hottest of Year in Chicago

Chicago, Sept. 14.—Today was the hottest of the year. The thermometer stood at ninety-two at two o'clock. Bathing beaches here were reopened.


**Hancock's Will.**
