Wife of Clemson College Professor Died Early Tuesday Morning.

Mrs. Benjamin Freeman, wife of Prof. Freeman of the chemistry department at Clemson college, died last night at 4 o'clock yesterday morning. The funeral services were held at the Episcopal chapel at 4:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon, being conducted by Rev. Maynard Marshall, rector and interment was made in the Old Stone church cemetery. Mrs. Freeman was about 30 years of age and was a Miss Spight before her marriage. Her husband and four children, one an infant, survive.
