NO FOOTBALL MEETING YESTERDAY AFTERNOON

GUARANTORS FAILED TO ATTEND AND IT WILL BE HELD AGAIN

BIG ATTRACTION

Auburn-Clemson Game Will Attract People From Many Sections of State.

Owing to the short notice, there was no attendance on the part of the guarantors from the Clemson-Auburn football game at the meeting which was to have been held in the office of Mr. T. Frank Watkins yesterday afternoon at 6 o'clock.

Another meeting will be held some time during the early part of next week, most probably on Monday afternoon.

At the meeting, which is to be held, various committees will be selected, probably one for attending to the advertising, one for seeing that the grounds at Benna Vista park are put in shape, one for the entertainment of the members of the teams while they are in Anderson, etc.

Probably nothing more than the Barnum and Bailey circus will attract a larger crowd to Anderson than the Clemson-Auburn game on October 16. This game is always watched by football fans over the entire south, especially the southern colleges, and its outcome generally decides to some extent the southern championship.

The Auburn team is expected to reach Anderson on Friday, October 15, and that afternoon they will engage in secret practice on the grounds on which the game is to be played. There will come to Anderson a large following of the Auburn team.

The Clemson team will practice on their home field the day before the game and will come to Anderson on Friday on a special train with the cadets and the faculty. Clemson being so near, it is expected that the entire student body will attend and this city will feel as if the encampment was on again.

It has not been determined yet what social entertainment will be arranged in Anderson for the visiting teams. If the manager of the Anderson theatre succeeds in getting the attraction, "Peg O' My Heart," for Saturday night of the game instead of the night before as is the time set now, probably nearly all of the Clemson cadets will be allowed to remain in the city until late that night. For some time there has been talk of a dance in honor of the football teams, but there is nothing definite planned yet.

BARNUM AND BAILEY CIRCUS OCTOBER 22

FIFTY ADVANCE MEN WERE IN ANDERSON YESTERDAY

WILL BE FOUR CARS

Doing Advertising Work Between Now and Date for Great Show—Big Aggregation.

The Barnum and Bailey "Greatest Show on Earth" is coming to Anderson on Friday, October 22, and this fact was being heralded all over the city yesterday by a crew of fifty men who arrived here Friday on the number one advertising car. This is just one of four advertising cars that will come here, together with several special brigades in between now and circus day more than 150 men will have taken part in the great advertising campaign that is being conducted. Gayly colored posters are beginning to adorn every available space in the city and surrounding country and a great holiday crowd may be expected.

Four hundred and eighty performers gathered from all nations is the announcement of the Barnum and Bailey management for this year and it is claimed that every nationality in the world is represented even to a complete Chinese circus from Peking, China. The circus program is introduced by a new spectacular pageant, Lalla Pook, in which more than 1250 people take part. This gorgeous procession cost the management a fortune to produce and in one section of the wonderful tournament are heard 300 musicians playing upon every kind of musical instrument and all in perfect harmony. There are many new trained animal acts that are entirely new to this country and among these are Mile. Adige's ten tango dancing lions, Madam Branda's flying horses, the marvellous "war elephants," Pallenberg's wonderful bicycle riding and roller skating bears and the Barnum and Bailey seven groups of posing horses.

The equipment of this, the biggest circus in the world, is transported on 85 double length cars and when the high tents are erected, among which, is the largest ever made, they represent a regular traveling city in themselves, with its own population of nearly 1500 people. In the great menagerie are 40 elephants and 110 cages, tanks and pens, containing every known specimen of rare wild beast that can possibly live in captivity. Nearly all of these are shown in open dens in the big free street parade given on the morning of circus day.

POSTPONE ISSUANCE OF GINNING REPORT

UPON PETITION OF NEW YORK EXCHANGE TO GOVERNMENT

DROPPED 50 POINTS

Circulation of Insignificant Rumor Caused Cotton to Be Thrown Overboard in Panic.

The action of the market yesterday illustrates the extremely sensitive condition that prevails in cotton. On the circulation of an insignificant false rumor, longs threw their cotton overboard in a panic and a drop of fifty points in fifteen minutes was registered. Almost immediately however the market steadied up under good buying and regained almost the entire loss, closing today within five to eight points of last night.

On petition of the New York exchange, the government agrees to postpone the issuance of the ginning report until Monday, but will issue condition report at 11 o'clock today. This petition was based on the fact that the storm had isolated New Orleans from the rest of the world and it is problematical as to just when communications would be fully restored.

The condition figures to be announced will compare with 72.5 last year, 64.1 the year before and 58.5 in 1909. The ten year average is 68.5. Private estimates published this week run from 60 to 62.5. Should the government sustain these figures a crop of about 11,500,000 bales will be indicated.
