Palms and ferns were artistically grouped about the altar, combined with masses of southern smilax. Long-stemmed white chrysanthemums were effectively used against the background of green. Just before the ceremony, numberless white cathedral tapers were lighted, casting a soft radiance over the pretty picture.

While the guests were assembling, Miss Eloise Peterson, presiding at the organ, furnished a program of appropriate wedding music. The approach of the bridal procession was announced by the notes of Lohengrin's Bridal Chorus. 
