

CLEMSON-AUBURN GAME TOMORROW

Teams of Championship Possibilities Will Meet On Gridiron in Anderson Saturday Afternoon

JUST A FEW THINGS ABOUT FOOTBALL GAME

WILL ENABLE SOME TO BETTER UNDERSTAND THEIR FIRST

MAKING GOALS

Three Ways in Which Team May Make Points, Touchdown, Goal and Field Goal.

The annual game of football between Clemson and Auburn, which will be played in this city Saturday, will be witnessed by 500 or 600 people who have never before seen a contest of this kind. Yet when they see the two teams line up, they will feel and see they will almost see the thrills of excitement run through the air.

A game of football is played by two opposing teams of eleven men each, this making the number equal. The positions on a team are as follows: Center, left and right guard, right and left tackle, right and left end. This composes what is commonly called the rush line. Then comes the back field; Quarterback, who calls the plays and directs the team; then the right and left halfbacks and the fullback.

When a team has possession of the ball you will notice that they are well bunched so as to form close interference for the one of their number who is carrying the ball, while the other team will be scattered so as to better see and stop the plays which are run after the interference.

Scores are made as follows: A touchdown is made by carrying the ball over the enemy's line where the goal post is erected and this counts six points. After a touchdown, the team making it is entitled to a kick for goal. A goal is made by kicking

the ball between the goal posts from the field and counts one point. A ball kicked over the goal from the field of play counts three points, and it must be, either a drop or a place kick.

Just before the beginning of the game a coin is tossed up to see which team will get the kickoff. In the beginning of the game the ball is kicked off from the center line between the two goals by the winning team and as soon as it is kicked both teams begin running. The ball is caught by a member of the opposing team who takes it up the field in the direction from which it came and keeps going until he is downed.

When a team has a ball they have to make 10 yards in four downs, or four plays. If they see at the end of the third down that they cannot make the 10 yards they kick the ball up the field and it is then put in play by the opposing team, which goes through the same maneuvers.

This is by no means a full account of the way a game of football is played. It is written with the intention of giving a clearer idea to those who have never seen one of what they may expect.

MANY AUTOS USED ON RURAL ROUTES

Atlanta, Oct. 14.—The automobile is crowding the horse off the highway faster than ever. Its adoption on rural postal routes is not only a new conquest for the motor car but is likely to lead to a far more general use of such machines throughout the country.

Experiments have convinced the postoffice department of the utility of the automobile for routes wherever the roads are fairly good. According to reports received in Atlanta, more than 500 motor routes have been authorized, and over 30 of them are already in operation. The department is now inaugurating a plan by which the carrier is required to provide his own car and pay its running expenses.

FINAL PRELIMINARY ARRANGEMENTS MADE

GROUNDS IN GOOD SHAPE—BLEACHERS BEING ERECTED

BUY TICKETS NOW

School Children Must Purchase Before Game—Parking Spaces for Machines.

The final preliminary arrangements for the football game in Anderson between Clemson and Auburn will be made today. All of the committees have been busy every day this week doing their share of the work and as far as the arrangements are concerned they are nearly completed.

Dr. John Major stated yesterday that tickets had been placed on sale at the following places in addition to those mentioned in The Intelligencer yesterday: Atkinson's, Evans Pharmacies Nos. 1 and 2. This makes a total of seven stations where tickets may be had and in addition a number of young ladies are selling them. School children are urged to buy their tickets before the game or else those over 15 years of age will have to pay the full price at the game. The students from Anderson college will purchase their tickets at 50 cents a piece but all other ladies will have to pay \$1.00. The Clemson cadets and members of the faculty will buy their tickets before coming to Anderson, this being the agreement since the proceeds from these sales will not be counted in the sum that has been guaranteed by the Anderson citizens.

The game will be called promptly at 3 o'clock on the field at Burns Vista park. Temporary bleachers are being erected around the field which will accommodate something like 1,500 people. The field is being put into good condition and goal posts have

been erected. Automobiles will be admitted to the grounds free of charge and these will find excellent parking places. There is expected to be an especially large number of machines there since if the roads dry up, numbers of people will come from the neighboring towns in their cars.

FRENCH ARMY HERO VISITOR IN ATLANTA

Atlanta, Oct. 14.—Among all the gold tinsel and glitter of the peace-soldiers at the Old Guard ball and reception at the Capital City club last night there was one war-soldier, the gallant Captain DuPont of the French army, who was in the trenches at Charleroi and who has been through some of the bitterest hand-to-hand fighting of the present war.

Although probably the only man at the ball who has been under actual fire during the past fifty years, Captain DuPont was garbed not as a soldier, but in the most commonplace civilian evening clothes. And the dear ladies, who so love the heroes, and who were so busy buzzing around the brilliantly uniformed members of the governor's horse guard and the younger members of the Old Guard, never realized, alas, that they were overlooking the most interesting hero of the occasion.

Of course such comments are not intended to obscure the glory of the few surviving members of the real Old Guard of the Gate City Guard who had their baptism of fire in the sixties. But there were not many of them present.

Lanes Postoffice Robbed.
Lanes, Oct. 14.—A masked white man at 8:30 o'clock last night entered the postoffice and forced the postmaster, E. G. Parker, at the point of a pistol, to open the safe and hand over a bag of money containing about \$35 in cash. The robber departed immediately, but no efforts were made to follow him. The postmaster telegraphed the information to a postoffice inspector.

WORD FROM CLEMSON SAYS THAT THIS WILL BE FEATURE

ONE TEAM TODAY

Members of Auburn Team Arrive in Anderson This Evening at 7:55 O'clock.

Tomorrow will be one of the greatest outing days in Anderson this year. The Clemson-Auburn football game is going to attract hundreds of people from all neighboring towns and the city will be overflowing with visitors. Special rates have been put on by the railroads leading into Anderson and many will take advantage of these to see one of the biggest football games played in the South this season.

The members of the Auburn team will arrive in the city this evening at 7:55 and will put up at the Hotel Chiquola. This evening they will be the guests of the Anderson Auburn alumni at the Anderson theatre to see "Peg O' My Heart" and will occupy the box on the right hand side of the pit.

The Clemson team will not arrive in the city until Saturday, coming on the special train with the other cadets. They will stop at the St. James hotel but will use the rear part of Smith, Garret and Barton's store room for dressing quarters, which will be close to the shower baths at Raynor's barbershop, which they will use.

It is not probable that there will be a dance in the city tomorrow evening for the members of the teams and the visitors. However, there will be a show at the Anderson theatre

and also a number of the lycam at Anderson college.

News from Clemson states that there will be a big parade of the Clemson cadets after the game, regardless of who wins. This will be an interesting sight, to see over 600 boys marching along. It will make the Anderson people feel as if the encampment was again in the city.

COMPARATIVE COTTON REPORT

Shows Increase in Amount Used in September Over Last Year.

Washington, Oct. 14.—The cotton used in the United States during September was 498,219 bales exclusively of linters the census bureau announced. Compared with 414,864 of September last year. There was on hand on September 30 in consuming establishments 1,089,614 bales, against 556,892 a year ago; in public storage and compresses 2,796,500 against 1,663,625 a year ago; September exports 502,031 against 125,778 a year ago. Imports were 26,197 against 15,315 and linters used 61,430 against 27,764 on hand September 30 in consuming establishments. 218,059 against 63,386; public warehouses and compresses 67,106 against 26,078; linters exported 10,624 against 1,893; spindles active 31,295,104, against 30,307,154.

"Dear Sir: "I just phoned Mr. Anderson that we would have more than 500 people for the special train on Saturday, and they will arrange for the train at the 50 cent rate. We will have 1000 ticket takers for our game, two at the large gate, and one at the pedestrian gate. I believe that it will be an excellent idea to have these hard gravelly spots on the field raked with a fine rake, which will put them in much better condition.
