

30 DAYS ALLOWED TO CONNECT SEWERAGE

HEALTH OFFICER CAMPBELL ISSUES STATEMENT TO THAT EFFECT

AN ORDINANCE

Of City Council Requires That All Lines Be Connected in That Length of Time.

Because of the negligence in enforcing the sewer connection ordinance of the city, the health officer, Mr. T. A. Campbell, has found it necessary to issue a statement to the effect that 30 days will be allowed for the making of sewer contracts by parties within the limits as described by the ordinance and that an additional 30 days will be allowed for the installation of the sewer connections.

The ordinances of the city provide that all houses on lots, the corner part thereof within 200 feet of a sewer main and within 300 feet of a water

main shall be connected with the sewer line, and as the present city council has extended the sewer mains in many parts of the city, this ordinance has not been enforced in a number of instances. This will have to be done, and Mr. Campbell has notified the public that 30 days are given as the time limit for contracts to be awarded for the installation of sewerage in houses which come under this ordinance and that thirty days more is given as the limit for the actual connections to be made.

AUTOMOBILES MUST PAY LICENSE FOR DAY

ORDINANCE PASSED BY CITY COUNCIL READS THAT WAY

NO LUNCH STANDS

Will Be Allowed On Circus Day Except Those Which Have Annual Licenses.

"Every automobile public service car which operates in Anderson on circus day will have to pay a license of \$10.00, said Chief Saunders, of the city police force yesterday afternoon. The idea of this is to protect the local public service men, who are exempt from this additional taxation, having paid their licenses at the first of the year.

This is in accordance with an ordinance passed by the city council last December, when it was realized by the council that many public service cars were being operated in Anderson on big days from other towns, and that they were getting the same benefit of the big crowds as the local men, and were only paying for the one day on which they ran. This license is placed on all public service cars which have not licenses for operation in the city. This exempts the local machines which are used the year round, and will make the outsiders pay the extra license.

Another important ordinance is that there are no lunch stand allowed on Main street on Circus Day. Those having the regular license for their stands, and having a regular position the year round for the nights are not included in this ordinance, which is intended to prohibit the sale of lunches on the main streets of the city.

For years, Anderson has been infested by a number of "fish stands" on South Main street each circus day. These stands are only for the day and are worth very little as revenue for the city. To remove these will mean that the streets will be much better for travel and there will be far less congestion of the pedestrian traffic on the sidewalks.

MRS. SHEARER'S CRITICAL CONDITION

Made Self-Inflicted Wound Early Thursday Morning.

Mrs. Grace C. Shearer, wife of Mr. W. M. Shearer, superintendent of the Williamston Cotton mills, is in a precarious condition as the result of a self-inflicted pistol wound. Early Thursday morning, while Mrs. Shearer was alone in her room at her residence at Williamston, the attempt at self destruction was made. Her husband was at the mill in the discharge of his duties when it occurred. He heard the shot, but attached no importance to it as boys in the neighborhood were sometimes in the habit of shooting firearms.

When Mr. Shearer, a little later, went to his home for breakfast he found Mrs. Shearer in a highly nervous state and talking wildly. Medical aid was immediately summoned and Drs. Lander of Williamston and Henry of Anderson came at once and did all they could to relieve her suffering.

For several years Mrs. Shearer's health has been far from good, and about two months ago she suffered a severe attack, from which she had never recovered although she was able to be up and spent a short while in Anderson with relatives for the purpose of recuperating. It was during a state of mental aberration caused by illness that the attempt to take her life was made, and from all the circumstances, back of her illness and at the time of the attempt, there is no doubt in the minds of the physicians and of the family that she was not mentally responsible when she committed the act.
