VON BISSING CLAIMS BELGIUM PROGRESSING

Berlin, Nov. 11.—The Brussels correspondent of Die Post sends a long interview with the governor general of Belgium, General von Bissing, in which the latter declares that in general he is entirely pleased with the manner in which the Belgian people have received his efforts to "put the country back on its feet again."

Strong-Arm Diplomacy.

Underneath all the false chatter of Balkan plot and counter plot and all the contradictory rumors of Greek and Rumanian intentions one solid all-important fact is gradually making itself evident. Allied troops are still being poured into Saloniki and perhaps into other parts of the peninsula.

That is the most important feature of the whole Balkan situation at present. The Serbian relief expedition is not going to be another fiasco like the expedition that was sent to relieve Antwerp. Great Britain and France are not relying upon what help they may get from others. They are proceeding to help themselves. They are not waiting for Russia or Rumania or Greece. They are throwing hundreds of thousands of their own soldiers into the new theatre of war to fight it out with von Mackensen and the Bulgarians.

Bulgaria's defection has been called a disgraceful defeat for allied diplomacy. The charges of stupidity and incompetency are probably unjust, but whether they are or are not is of little practical moment now. The point is that France and Great Britain have discovered and have started to employ the only kind of diplomacy that can prevail in the Balkans—the diplomacy of the rifle and the bayonet, the field gun and the trench mortar. They have stopped sending promises to Greece and Rumania and are sending army corps and more army corps and still more army corps. They may not avert disaster by this method, but this is the only method to which disaster can be averted.—News and Courier.
