SEVERAL MATTERS UP BEFORE COUNCIL

REGULAR MEETING WAS HELD YESTERDAY AFTERNOON

FIREMEN'S PAY

Will Be Increased On Nov. 15, According to Recent Provision—Regret Expressed.

The regular monthly meeting of city council was held yesterday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock and several matters of interest were disposed of. Nothing of great importance was transacted but the minor business consumed a great deal of time.

After all approved bills were ordered paid the cemetery committee made an unfavorable report on the matter of securing more land for Silver Brook cemetery.

On motion it was decided to have "slow down" signs placed on West Market and North Fant streets near the large school building, this being done to protect the school children. These signs are used in all of the larger cities near school buildings and do a great deal of good.

The fact that the street at the intersection of Calhoun street and Richard avenue was in bad condition was brought to the attention of council. This condition has been caused by recent work and council decided to have this attended to at once.

A petition was read for a small incandescent light to be placed on Coughlin avenue near Ernest Kay's store. This matter was referred to the water and light committee.

A petition was also presented asking that the sidewalk on the north side of West Franklin street from Market be curbed, drained and paved. This was referred to the street committee with power to act.

A motion was made that the paving on the north side of West Whitner street be extended 500 feet further, but this motion was lost.

The fact that certain signs in the city do not comply with the city's ordinance regarding this matter was brought up for disposal. His question was referred to Mayor Godfrey who will see the owners of such signs and will have them to regulate these conditions.

The sanitary committee was given power to secure necessary dump wagons to carry on the usual work. Some of the old ones have worn out and are beyond repair.

Salaries of Firemen.

In accordance with a provision made by council one year ago, those firemen who have been in the service for the past twelve months will get an increase in pay. This provides that the regular firemen be paid \$55 per month, the chief \$80, assistant chief \$70 and assistant driver \$65. The assistant chief is the regular driver of the truck.

Alderman J. E. Burton moved that council express regrets, of the death of the late D. H. Russell, who had been serving as recorder. This motion was adopted.

Too Many Laws.

Within two months the 1916 session of the general assembly of the state will be in session. Perhaps we may be permitted a word or two in expressing an opinion as to what the body should do, or, rather, what it should not do. Our observation is that no statewide laws of importance are pending or are apt to be introduced. Already there are too many laws on the statute books. Thomas Jefferson it was, we believe, who said that the least governed people are the best governed. What the sage of Monticello said in this connection is true today as it was a century ago. For years it has seemed to be the policy of each succeeding general assembly to try to outdo its predecessor in the number of laws passed. Many laws to be found in the statute books are of trivial character and are more honored in the breach than in the observance. There exists not a few such laws which are unknown to the people and the consequences are violated daily. There was no demand for them, and there is a general lack of information concerning them. Sometimes it has seemed to us the motive actuating members of the general assembly in insisting on the passage of this or that worthless law was not how much good the commonwealth would derive from it but rather personal gratification and perhaps the little prestige its enactment would afford the member when he returned to his constituency, with the statement that he was the author of the measure. There are, as we have said, many laws on the statute books which we were better off without and we trust that the general assembly of 1916 will have a care in passing legislation of doubtful value. NEW STREET FLUSHER IS NOT SATISFACTORY

COMPANY TO BE INSTRUCTED IN REGARD TO THIS

TRACTION ENGINE

Committee Appointed to Dispose of City's Engine Which Cannot Now Be Used.

At the meeting of city council yesterday afternoon it was decided to try to dispose of the street flusher which was recently purchased, owing to the fact that it was not giving satisfaction. Accordingly the matter was referred to Mayor Godfrey, who will write to the company, from which the machine was bought, telling them that its work is not satisfactory and that it is here for their disposal.

The street flusher is operated by means of air pressure, in connection with a strong water pressure when the water is put into the tank from the hydrant. Owing to the lack of pressure in the hydrants the machine will not give satisfaction.

Dispose of Engine.

A committee consisting of Messrs. Tate, King and Barton was appointed to sell the old traction engine belonging to the city, and to purchase a light scrape to be drawn by mules. Owing to the street paving it will be impossible to use the traction engine over these streets, and it was thought best to dispose of it.

CHANGED BOUNDARIES IN WARDS YESTERDAY

COUNCIL PASSED ORDINANCE AT MEETING FOR THE CHANGE

WARD FOUR AND SIX

Will Be Different in Future—Alderman Carter Explained That People Wanted Change.

At the meeting of the city council yesterday afternoon the question of changing the ward boundaries of Ward 4 and Ward 6 was brought up. The request for this change has been made by residents of Daley, Provost, Whitner and I. streets, they stating that they have difficulties in getting to the polls when at work in the city of Anderson. Alderman Carter has been instrumental in having this change made.

The following ordinance was passed:

Be it ordained by the city council of Anderson, South Carolina, as follows:

1. That hereafter the boundaries of Ward four (4) of the city of Anderson, South Carolina, shall be as follows:

Ward 4. Beginning at a point where the centre of South Main street intersects the boundary line of the city, thence northerly along the centre of Main street to its intersection with Benson street on the public square, thence westerly along the centre of Benson street to its intersection with Jail street, thence southerly along the centre of Jail street to its intersection with West Market street, thence westerly along the centre of West Market street to Whitner's creek, thence along Whitner's creek to the centre of Mill street, thence westerly along the centre of Mill street to the centre of F street, thence northerly along the centre of F street to the centre of King street, thence westerly along centre of King street to its intersection with the boundary line of the city, thence southerly along said boundary line to beginning corner.

2. That hereafter the boundaries of Ward six (6) of said city shall be as follows:

Ward 6. Beginning at a point in the centre of King street where it intersects the boundary line of the city on the west, thence easterly along the centre of F street to the centre of Mill street, thence easterly along the centre of Mill street to Whitner's creek, thence northward up Whitner's creek to where it intersects the boundary line of the city on the north, thence westerly along said boundary line to the beginning point.

That any and all ordinances, or parts of same, inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

That this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage.

ANDERSON LOST AGAIN TO WOFFORD FIGHTERS

FAST GAME RESULTED IN SCORE 12 TO 7 IN THEIR FAVOR

A PRETTY KICK

The local high school team was defeated in the football game by Wofford Friday afternoon to the score of 12 to 7. The game was a pretty one from every standpoint and the Anderson boys deserved to win, they having the game won by one point until five minutes before the end of the game. The Wofford team was a little heavier and better trained than the Anderson men, but luck was with them too.

The ball was on the 15 yard line, having been advanced about 10 yards when Major, referee, penalized Anderson 10 yards for allowing the spectators to come close to the goal line. Standing behind his own goal, King attempted to kick, but the kick was short and the ball was down on Anderson's eight yard line in Spartanburg's possession. The second down brought the second goal. No goal was kicked in this case and after the next kickoff, and the ball was well into Spartan territory, the game was called.

Both teams played good, scrappy ball, and the Spartan victory, though it was a hard luck loss to Anderson, was certainly deserved. Anderson's only mistake seemed to be that the ball was not kicked down the field earlier in the last few minutes of play.
