SPORT "DOPE"

It was stated in error in The Intelligencer yesterday morning that Columbia won both games from Columbus Wednesday, as the Capital City club only captured one. As a result Augusta, by winning both games from Jacksonville, was tied yesterday with Columbia for first place, and today the Georgia club holds its own on the strength of Columbia's defeat at the hands of Jacksonville, a team generally conceded to be the weakest in the South Atlantic league this season.

Clemson's 16 to 6 victory over Trinity college yesterday must have made the Furman boys feel good. The Baptists may well feel good over their baseball aggregation, as the Man-eaters have one of the strongest clubs they have had in years and to play a club of their ability 17 innings without allowing a score to be made is a feat well worth crowing about.

Just what effect the postponement of games this season has had upon the various teams of the two big leagues is hard to say but the league standing when compared with that of a year ago, shows considerable shifting oppositions. In the National league Philadelphia was leading, Cincinnati was second instead of fifth; Chicago and Boston held third and fourth places; Pittsburgh and Brooklyn fifth and sixth; St. Louis was seventh instead of second and New York last. Among the American league clubs Detroit led with New York second; Boston was in fourth place instead of setting the pace; Washington was third in place of being tied for fourth with Chicago and St. Louis; Cleveland was fifth, two notches higher than this year and the Athletics seventh instead of last.

More than \$100,000 is to be expended on the new grounds of the Chicago Tennis club. When the present arrangements of the club are completed the organization will have one of the finest tennis plants in the middle west and will stage numerous state and sectional championship tournaments. The site of the club covers two blocks on the north side and cost \$70,000. An additional \$30,000 will be spent in preparing turf and clay courts, club houses and other accommodations for the players. The membership which is expected to reach 700 by the time the courts are ready, will include all the leading players of Chicago and vicinity.

Letters received in this country from by friends of a prominent English trainer of pugilists, tell of an unique way in which he has turned his knowledge into money in connection with the war. For some years he has possessed the secret of a brine preparation which has been in great demand among boxers for hardening, or to use ring vernacular "Pickling" the skin of the hands and face. Shortly after the beginning of the war he was requested to prepare a quantity for use on the feet of soldiers, which swelled and cracked under the rigors of the field campaign. His first offering was so satisfactory to the government officials that he is now running a large factory day and night turning out brine for the soldiers both in France, Egypt and at home.

Although he holds the record for consecutive hits, Jack Nees was unable to win a place with the Chicago White Sox and has been released to Baltimore. While a member of the Oakland club of the Pacific Coast league last season, Nees hit safely one or more times in forty-five consecutive games. His record included 183 times at bat; 85 runs; 81 one-base hits; 14 two-base hits; 2 three-base hits and seven home runs.
