 That their faith in the power of knowledge is not deteriorating has been proven by their recent magnificent equipment of the Jackson high school.
 During vacation the school board procured for the high school grades, physical apparatus and laboratory supplies that well established colleges might be proud of. The latest and best in maps and text books have been furnished for all the rooms. In addition, a complete set of the New International Encyclopedia has arrived this week. As The International is considered the "Court of Final Appeal," on all scientific questions, its high place has limited its circulation to the favored few.
 That a village school should possess such exceptional advantages bespeaks a spirit of appreciation, which places the student body of Jackson under heavy obligations.
 It is a common complaint that the indifference of parents is a serious handicap to the intellectual progress of their children, but if youth so favored fail to attain more than mediocre rank among the competitors for "Learning's Prizes," the failure can be ascribed only to their own inability to estimate rightly their privileges, and to profit by their peculiarly favorable opportunities.
