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**County School Notes.**  
BY SUPT. GEO. J. BOUCHER.  
Regular examination this week.  
All schools are now open. By raising the salaries, teachers have been induced to come in from other counties and helped a great deal toward filling out. The average raise for the county is five dollars per month.  
Of the teachers who held a certificate in this county under the old law, only one has been unable to pass the state examination. This is much better than the average county has been able to do. Some counties, the state superintendent says, literally went to pieces.  
"Your teachers have made a wonderful record." This from the state superintendent in answer to our question the other day as to the relative showing of counties under the new certification law. Dakota county teachers may well feel proud to merit such a statement from the head of the state department.  
The joint meeting at Emerson Saturday last was a decided success, in every way. The attendance was the largest in the history of the joint association, and the interest shown was beyond all question, the best; even better than the average state meeting. Among those present from outside the five counties were: State Superintendent Mc'Brien, Lincoln; Superintendent Clemmons, Valentine; President W H (Watson), Fremont Normal, and Geo L Towne, of the Nebraska Teacher. Between three and four hundred teachers were in attendance.
