Bryant Wins in Land Case.
The following decision was handed down in the supreme court in the Bridenbaugh-Bryant case last Friday. A decision was rendered in the district court about a year ago, in which the land in controversy reverted to Bryant, who was also taxed with the costs in the case. Bridenbaugh appealed from the decision with the following results:
1. Evidence examined and held to support finding of trial judge.
2. The fact that the boundary lines of fields and highways, as established by the early settlers, are in harmony with disputed monuments, is relevant as tending to show that such monuments are true corners.
3. The essential elements of the action of ejectment are legal estate, a right of possession in the plaintiff, and unlawful detention by defendant; and the plaintiff cannot recover where the latter element is lacking.
