Will Brown was here from Homer Sunday, and was fortunate in regaining possession of a lost pocket robe that was advertised in last week's Herald.

The robe was found by Mail Carrier E. J. McKernan, and two days after the paper was issued was restored to the owner. Verily it pays to advertise—in The Herald, because everybody reads it—that can read.

Judge A. A. Welch of Wayne, held a session of district court here Saturday, and heard arguments in the case where-in Tom Sullivan and others asked for a writ of mandamus to compel county clerk W. L. Ross to place the names of the democratic candidates for county offices upon the official ballot. The question at stake was whether the names of candidates could be placed on the official ballot where the candidates had not complied with the provisions of the primary law which requires that all candidates must either file nomination papers before the primary is held, or secure a petition of two hundred signers after the primary, and in both cases pay a filing fee of \$5.00.

Judge Welch refused the writ on the grounds that it would be compelling the clerk to place the names on the ticket before the proper time as provided by law. In his decision he stated that the names of candidates written on the primary ballot should be counted, as a refusal to do so would interfere with the constitutional right of a voter to vote for whoever he chooses. An amendment by Attorney Pizey, and the case will be heard when the proper time arrives.
