Julius Bonderson, of Emerson precinct, has finally consented to serve as commissioner from the 3rd district, filling the vacancy on the board caused by the resignation of Fred Blume. The people of Dakota county can rest assured that the interests of the county will not be neglected on the part of Mr. Bonderson.

District court has been in session here all this week. The case of King vs. Foltz was called for trial Monday, which was a suit brought by James M. The case was concluded Wednesday noon and Mr. King was given the custody of his child. Each party was taxed with its own costs. The Berry-McAllister contest case, over the result of the recent election for the office of county attorney, in which F. S. Berry contested the election of J. J. McAllister, is now being heard. This case was decided in favor of Berry in the county court, where the recount showed a difference of eleven votes in Summit precinct alone, which would change the result of the election in favor of Berry if the lower court is sustained.

Word came here Monday by telegram from Venango, Nebr., announcing the death of Edward Bodenbender, son of Mrs. H. Bodenbender of this precinct. From what can be learned his death resulted from apoplexy, and when the coroner concluded the inquest the remains were taken in charge by the Odd Fellows and interred in the cemetery at Julesburg. The deceased, who was born and raised in this county, located on a claim in Colorado, near the Nebraska line, only a few months ago and apparently had the brightest prospects ahead of him. He boarded with a family living on an adjoining claim, and was last seen alive Sunday afternoon at about 3 o'clock. When he did not appear for breakfast Monday morning a search was instituted and his lifeless body was found about a hundred yards from the house, on the road leading to his boarding place. When news of his death came Geo. I. Miller, his brother-in-law, and George Hirschbach left for Julesburg to look after the remains and if possible bring them home for interment, but owing to the length of time he had been dead and the time taken up in holding the inquest and removing the body to Julesburg, the undertaker was unable to embalm it, and it was deposited in the Julesburg cemetery Tuesday afternoon. Messrs. Miller and Hirschbach returned Thursday afternoon from their sad mission.


