COUNTY SCHOOL NOTES

BY SUPT. W. E. VOSS

It is the wish of the state department of public instruction to make the work for this biennium count for the greatest practical good to all parts of the school system of the state, and particularly to the rural school.

There are so many lines of activity which these schools might pursue with profit that it has been decided to give to the teachers of all parts of the state, who wish to put extra time and effort into their work, special help and encouragement along lines a little out of the usual rut into which we are all so likely to fall. This will be done by means of a correspondence class conducted by Miss Anna V Day, assistant state superintendent.

It will be the purpose of this class to suggest ways in which interest may be aroused in bettering both the material conditions of the schools and the academic work, to devise and put into operation work which will help to develop the children to the fullest extent mentally, physically and morally.

One of the lines to be emphasized at once will be "The Beautifying of the School Grounds," and bettering the conditions without the school house. As each line works out and results become apparent, other lines will be taken up.

Membership in the class is limited to five rural teachers from each county. Only successful, energetic, wide awake, resourceful teachers, who will not be easily discouraged by difficulties, will be desirable members. Have we any such teachers? If so, please make application at once.

This office has a number of copies of a bulletin regarding the work that can yet be done (and continued next fall) in agriculture and the school garden line. A progressive teacher will desire to take up this work when the unattractive and unsanitary conditions of the rural schools are brought to her mind by the material which may be had upon request.

Every school yard in the county should be enclosed by a woven wire fence. It is a shame the way some school yards are run over by cattle and roved up by the hogs and even driven over by the general public. Is a school house and its yard entitled to less consideration than your home and its yard? If so, the appearance of your home will explain why you think that way.

I advise you to re-hire your teacher now for next year if her work is satisfactory. Don't wait until late in the summer to do this work. The two members of the board whose terms do not expire next July, may do the contracting now.

Teachers, are your certificates going to run out before you begin teaching next fall? Remember that you will not be permitted to contract for a school without having a certificate in force nor has a school board a right to hire you without first seeing your certificate. The thing to do is to get your credits as early as possible and then get your certificate filled out when needed.
