Washington Special to Sioux City

Journal, 4th: The emergency bill for the appropriation of \$50,000 for the protection of the Missouri river bank near South Sioux City, Neb, was called up by Senator Norris Brown and passed the senate this afternoon. So thoroughly had the joint committee from Sioux City and Dakota county done its work that there was not one vote against it. This fact so astonished the officers of the senate, who thought no more bills of this kind would be allowed to pass during this session, that they threw up their hands in surprise, and the secretary remarked that the impossible had happened. The measure was signed by the vice president and speaker and will be signed by the president soon.

Homer Star: Ed Wilkins came down from Long Pine last Saturday to attend the funeral of his aunt, Mrs Fred Wilkins....Roy Rymill and Ross Johnson left for York, Monday afternoon, where they will enroll with the ball team at that place in the Nebraska state league....N F Hansen and Chas Dodge are hauling the material to the twenty acres north of Homer, recently purchased by the former where a new house, barn and outbuildings will be built....A deal was consummated the first of the week wherein Edwards & Bradford are the possessors of the Carrie Allen's lot just north of the former's store site, the consideration being \$1,000.00....Mrs Margaret Ashford received a painful fall last week while descending the stairs at her home east of town. No serious results are apprehended, however, as she is getting along nicely at this writing....J M King last week disposed of his 160 acre farm in Blyburg to Herman Hurley for \$12,000. This farm contains about 160 acres, about 75 on the bottom, the balance in timber and pasture in the hills. All Hurley will not move onto it until next spring, but is now in possession of the same....Chas M Borowaky, W E Smith and M Mason went to Sioux City this morning in the former's auto, where they will consult Contractor Shulbach in regard to erecting their new rectory buildings. Mr Borowaky will start his building the first of the week and erect a brick building 25x60 two stories. Mr Smith has several plans in view but is signing strong on a one story brick with a 40 foot front and 75 foot deep.

Sioux City Journal, 4: Government engineers in Sioux City yesterday said that the \$50,000 appropriated for river work here by the United States senate yesterday in all probability will be used to construct a mat and crushed stone foundation on the Nebraska side of the Missouri river. The mat would be of woven willows. It would be 5,000 feet long and eighty-six feet wide. The wall would slope from the top of the bank to the water edge. Several thousand cars of crushed stone would be required to finish the work. Retention work on the Nebraska shore will be completed this afternoon. The government will keep several men on the banks for a week for repair work, providing it is needed. Plenty of stone are available to complete the stringing of fascines, which was started nearly two weeks ago. The bank has stopped caving in.... With the exception of W E Holmes, secretary of the Commercial club, the committee sent to Washington, D C, to secure an appropriation for protecting the Nebraska bank of the Missouri river opposite Sioux City, has returned home. The committee consisted of Mr Holmes, W H Beck and A E Burgess, of Sioux City, and William P Warner and Judge R E Evans, of Dakota City. The committee members are enthusiastic regarding the reception they received at Washington and the aid given them in securing audiences with committees and officials of the war department. Mr Beck stated the Nebraska and Iowa delegations exerted every effort to help the committee. The senate committee on commerce had ruled that it would consider no more bills of this kind, but the Nebraska representatives pulled down the bars and secured an audience for the Iowa-Nebraska committee. Maj E H Schulz, of Kansas City, government engineer in charge of the Missouri river, also sided the committee, Mr Beck said, by sending telegrams stating the need of an immediate appropriation. While the original request was for a \$50,000 appropriation, the figure was set at \$50,000 by the war department, stated committee members, as that sum was considered sufficient for the work of protecting the Nebraska bank of the river above South Sioux City.

Sioux City Tribune, 6th: Substitution of some sort of power, probably electric, for the present manual method of opening and closing draws in the Combination bridge is expected by the government experts to result from a recent visit to Sioux City by Major Schulz, of the Kansas City government engineering office, and a subsequent report on general river conditions made by Capt J Fred Heckman, master and pilot of the government river boat

Lieutenant Lewis. It is the contention of the government that there has been a great amount of unnecessary delay thus far this summer and considerable time has been lost at the Sioux point revetment work, because boats were forced to wait upon the opening of the bridge. Thus far this spring, the Lieutenant Lewis has made 16 trips through the bridge, and it was stated by Captain Heckman that often the work was delayed at least a day because the boat was unable to get material to the scene of operations. The government has been impatient with the operation of the bridge for some time, he said, and on a recent visit to the city Major Schulz asked for an immediate report. This was made Saturday and has been sent to the government headquarters. Captain Heckman stated that the only reasons given by the bridge keeper were high wind and inability to get men. Whenever there is a hard wind prevailing, there is danger of seriously damaging the bridge in opening the draw. The inability to get men handily seems a good excuse to the government officers, as under ordinary conditions it does not take a large number, and they should be on hand, so as not to delay the passage of a boat. The recent delays of government boats has been a costly proposition for the bridge company, according to Mr Heckman, who says that the company must pay for every delay that is forced upon the boat. The cost of laying up a boat a day is considerable. In case anything serious should happen to a boat up the river and it was unable to get a place where it might be repaired, the company would be liable for the damage to the boat, and in case it sank, for the full cost. Such an instance happened nine years ago, when the government boat Benton sank above the bridge. Mr Heckman said the bridge company paid \$8,000.
