The following item reproduced by the Sioux City Journal from its files of twenty years ago, September 1, 1893, will be of interest to those who attended the reunion at that date: "The old settlers' reunion was held at Crystal Lake yesterday brought out a bigger attendance than any similar event of years past. It is estimated that 4,000 people visited the grounds during the day, not all of them being pioneers nor directly interested in the early settlers of Dakota county. The annual address of welcome was delivered by President John Naffziger. Other speakers were D L Sullivan, of Sioux City; Mel C Jay, Dakota City and Ed T Kearney, the Jackson, Neb, banker. A letter of regret was read from John T Bayha, of Red Cloud, who named Crystal Lake. The following officers were elected: President, John W Hazelgrove; vice president, Capt O'Connor; secretary, John T Spencer; financial secretary, A H Baker; corresponding secretary, Judge William Warner; treasurer, Thomas Ashford; historian, M M Warner. There was an unusually large attendance from Sioux City.

### AIM TO EDUCATE FARMERS.

Sioux City Fair Managers Contract for Cooking, Canning and Disease War Shows.

Through the Interstate Fair cooking and farming experts expect to spread from Sioux City gospel that will improve home and farming conditions in Iowa, Nebraska, South Dakota and Minnesota. These experts will come to Sioux City on September 15 and will remain until the fair closes on September 19, giving daily lectures.

Dr. G. A. Johnson, government inspector at the Sioux City stock yards, will give a series of lectures and demonstrations, aimed to correct animal diseases at inception. A fight against animal tuberculosis will be urged by Dr. Johnson, and the way to meet the disease made clear. Dr. Johnson will also demonstrate that thousands of dollars can be saved to farmers in every county in the territory by properly directed effort to destroy tapeworms.

E. C. Bishop, state agent for the national department of agriculture, is to be given demonstration room for a course of lessons in canning fruit. This feature, the fair managers expect, will attract the attention of all the housewives in the Sioux City territory. The department of agriculture is forming canning clubs throughout Iowa, and effort will be made to form such clubs at the fair. Girls make up the membership. They are thus given first lessons in cookery.

Experts in domestic science will come to the fair from Ames to teach cooking, cooks the most scientific methods of preparing foodstuffs for the table. These experts will make a fight against the high cost of living by showing how cheaper cuts of meat may be utilized in the kitchens.

Ames college is to offer an exhibit aimed to improve farming methods and a corps of instructors will explain each exhibit. Better grain, more economical farm processes, improved live stock and higher class dairy results will come in for attention at the hands of western instructors.

Trop rotation, weed dangers, feeding of stock and kindred topics will be discussed in addresses. Instruction also will be conveyed in pamphlet form. This exhibit and lecture series will, it is thought, be worth thousands of dollars to the farmers in the Sioux City territory.

Cooking, sewing, fruit canning, school work, better cattle and horses will get further attention in the great exhibit halls on the fair grounds. Here, too, experts will be at hand to explain the processes used in attaining best results.
