Telephone Company Issues Employees Benefit Report

During the first six months of this year the Northwestern Bell Telephone company distributed \$19,236.00 among its 10,750 employees in the five states of Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska, North and South Dakota in pensions, accident, sickness and death benefits, according to a report just published.

During the first six months of this year there were 215 accidents among this number of employees—34 less than during the corresponding period last year.

There were 450 cases of sickness—105 less than during the first six months of 1921.

Twenty-six veteran telephone men and women are on the pension roll of the telephone company in this territory.

The Northwestern Bell and the other companies of the Bell System were among the first of the large industrial organizations to provide sickness, accident, death and pension benefits free of cost to their employees. The distribution of the benefits is directed by a committee of employees.

The employees benefit plan, telephone officials explain, reduces worry and helps greatly to make employees happier, more contented and hence more efficient.
