NOTICE TO HOMESTEADERS

The Herald is in receipt of a letter from Congressman M. P. Kin-kaid, dated August 18th, giving information in regard to the leave of absence recently granted homesteaders from their claims. Following is the letter:

For the advice of the public, especially for the advice of homesteaders, I write to advise you of the provisions of the Act providing for the absence of homesteaders from their claims on account of the drought conditions, in contemplating that you will be pleased to publish the same. The area contained in all the land office districts in our 5th Congressional District is included in the bill. The Act provides: "That all persons who have heretofore made homestead entries in (naming the different land office districts in the various states covered by the bill) are hereby relieved from the necessity of residence and cultivation upon their lands from the date of the approval of this Act to April 15, 1912: Provided, That the time of actual absence during the period named shall not be deducted from the full time of residence required by law."

I regret to say, the Act requires that the time of absence of which an entryman avails himself will have to be made up, the same as if he had obtained a leave of absence upon individual application therefor under the existing statute, but under this Act no application for leave of absence is necessary. The Act is understood to apply to all entries, whether residence has been commenced or not, thus extending the time in which residence may be commenced until April 15th, 1912.
