AUTOMOBILE BEATS PASSENGER TRAIN

On Wednesday of this week Norman McCorkle made an unprecedented automobile record for this part of the west with a Maxwell car. A lady of Billings, Montana, was returning home from the east on 43. During the twenty minutes stop in this city, she went to a restaurant for lunch. Upon her return to the station she found her train was pulling out and she was unable to catch it. She hurried to the Speedway garage, three blocks distant, and offered Norman McCorkle twelve dollars if he would overtake the train for her. The train had considerable start and also had the advantage of a shorter distance than the wagon road as the track follows the northwest from here. But the roads were in ideal condition and Norman made the Maxwell hit a pace right around fifty miles an hour. He overtook the train at Berea, ten miles from Alliance, where the lady boarded it and went on her way rejoicing.

Obituary

The remains of Mrs. Alfreda Wilson, whose death was mentioned in last week's Herald, arrived Sunday noon from Calgary, Canada, Mrs. Gregory Zurn, mother of the deceased, returning from that place on the same train. Judge Zurn had gone to Crawford to meet the train and he and other relatives arrived at the same time. The husband, Clarence E. Wilson, could not come with the remains on account of being taken sick and threatened with typhoid fever. He will come to Alliance as soon as he is able to do so.

The funeral was held Monday, at ten o'clock, a.m., at the M. E. church conducted by the pastor, Rev. Olin S. Baker. There was a large attendance at the funeral, including members of the Eastern Star, the Rebekas and the I. O. O. F.

The deceased was born in Box Butte county, June 3, 1894. She was married to Clarence E. Wilson, December 22, 1911, and with her husband left Alliance the next day. She died May 13, 1912, after a short illness of typhoid fever. A large circle of friends in Alliance sincerely sympathize with the bereaved relatives whose hearts have been saddened by the untimely death of this noble young woman.
