CHURCH DEDICATION

Immanuel's German Lutheran Church, Northeast Corner Seventh St. And Yellowstone Avenue

NEXT SUNDAY, JUNE 30, 1912

Next Sunday, June 30, Immanuel's German Lutheran church will be dedicated to the services of the Lord. That will certainly be a day of great joy and thanksgiving for the members of this little Lutheran congregation. After many years of hard struggles and trials they have finally come to their own.

As many readers of this paper will undoubtedly know, a German Lutheran mission in and about Alliance has been carried on for the last twenty years. This mission was started in the year 1893 by Rev. J. D. Schroeder, at that time living at Hemingford and now residing at Grafton, Wisconsin. He conducted the first Lutheran service in this vicinity on the 18th of September, in the year 1893, in a little sod schoolhouse four miles north of Alliance. Later on services were held in the M. E. church.

After Rev. Schroeder's departure from Hemingford in the year 1895 this mission was served by the pastors, Wunderlich, Wings, Schulz, Eggers and Rozack, who in succession resided at Hemingford and preached at intervals in Alliance. They conducted services in various localities, for some time in the M. E. church, then in the court house, then several times in the German Congregational church and finally in Mark's hall.

In the year 1911 the Rev. Titus Lang, who was placed in charge of the Lutheran mission district in this part of the state was called upon to make his residence in Alliance. Under his leadership a Sunday school congregation and a German-English parochial school were organized and the Drake building on Sweetwater avenue was rented for church and school purposes. This hall however, being quite small and inconvenient, the congregation decided to build a church of its own. A lot was purchased on the corner of Yellowstone avenue and Seventh street and the present building erected. The same is 40 x 24 ft., and 13 ft. from floor to ceiling, has a hall and belfry and is appropriately furnished for church and school purposes.

Services will be conducted in this new church for the first time next Sunday. There will be a German service in the morning commencing at 10 o'clock, in which Rev. H. J. Eggold, of Scottsbluff, will preach the sermon, and English service in the afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, in which Rev. Hillert from Dalton, Neb. will preach, and a German service in the evening conducted by the local pastor, Rev. Titus Lang.

The congregation kindly invites all its friends to attend these services and partake of her joy and thanksgiving, and wishes to thank most heartily all her patrons who kindly helped her in building this new little church.


