**FAINTS AT BOODLE HEARING**

Prosecutor Stricken While Examining Detroit Alderman.

Detroit, Aug. 26.—The preliminary examination of Alderman Louis Brozo, charged with bribery, came to a dramatic halt when Charles T. Wilkins, special assistant to Prosecuting Attorney Shepherd, suddenly collapsed unconscious in his chair.

One of the first men to rush for medical assistance was Alderman David Rosenthal, one of the eighteen whose conviction Wilkins has been attempting to secure.

Detective Brennan testified that he offered Brozo \$100 to make a speech at a council meeting in favor of closing a street for the benefit of the Wash road and then voting for such an ordinance. Brozo, so Brennan testified, agreed to the proposition and called at the detective's office again on July 25, when, the latter claimed, he paid the bribe.

**KILL EACH OTHER IN DUEL**

Illinoisan Fails in Effort to Slay Wife. Sister Opens Fire.

Tom Guffy and his wife's sister, Mrs. Anna Flober, shot and killed each other at Herrin, Ill.

Guffy called at his mother-in-law's home, where his wife, who had left him a month ago, was living. His wife fled. He fired at her, but the bullet went wide.

Her sister, sitting in a room by a window with a loaded revolver, opened fire on Guffy, and a pistol duel between the two followed. Eleven shots were fired.

A bullet from his gun pierced her heart, but not until she had emptied six bullets into Guffy's body.

**SCRUTINIZE TRUST OF BANKS**

Charge for Exchange on Checks in New York Under Inquiry.

Washington, Aug. 26.—The department of justice is engaged in an investigation which may result in some sensational prosecutions. Besides the inquiry which is being instituted with respect to the American Bell Telephone and Telegraph company and a canning combination, it was learned that the department is investigating an alleged combination of the banking interests in New York to control the exchange charge on checks cleared through New York.

**Writer Held for Shooting.**

Brockton, Aug. 26.—David Farnsworth of Bridgewater, a magazine writer, was held to the grand jury in \$3,000 bail on a charge of manslaughter after a hearing in the police court. He is alleged to have shot and fatally wounded Thomas Hagan on Aug. 15. Farnsworth, who formerly lived in Wilmette, Ill., claimed he discovered Hagan in his poultry yard and discharged his shotgun to frighten the man away, not intending to hit him.

**"Hunger Strike" Not Yet Broken.**

Dublin, Aug. 26.—The forcible feeding continues of Mary Leigh and Gladys Evans, the suffragette prisoners who started a "hunger strike" some days ago. It is said the health of Mary Leigh is causing grave anxiety to the prison authorities.

**Suspect May Be Gyp the Blood.**

Milford, Pa., Aug. 26.—A man believed to be "Gyp the Blood," wanted in New York in connection with the murder of Herman Rosenthal, is reported arrested at Greeley.

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
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
