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BRIDGEPORT TO HAVE ANOTHER NEWSPAPER

Northport Herald Will Move Across River and Change Name to Bridgeport Herald

WILL FILL LONG FELT WANT

Hon. C. D. Casper, editor and publisher of The Northport Herald, announces in his paper that it will be moved across the North Platte river March 1st and the name changed to The Bridgeport Herald. When the editor of The Alliance Herald, assisted by Mr. Casper, started The Northport Herald about a year ago, many Bridgeport people urged that it be established at that place, but it was thought best for several reasons to begin publication at Northport.

There is at Bridgeport, as in many other county seat towns, a coterie of politicians, otherwise spoken of sometimes as a clique, who have an undue influence in public affairs, not because their number is large, but because of machine methods. The rank and file of the people, who are opposed to the rule of self-appointed bosses, are often unable to throw it off on account of leadership, although they are in the majority. Just as naturally as "birds of a feather flock together" do standpat politicians of both republican and democratic parties cooperate.

Mr. Casper is an old time democratic editor of the progressive sort. Since he assumed entire charge of The Northport Herald he has been impugned by many of the best people of Bridgeport to come over to their town. While regretting to see Northport deprived of its paper we are pleased to know that Bridgeport will have one edited by the venerable C. D. Casper. We congratulate the good people of the last named town on the acquisition of a newspaper that will stand for "democracy and democracy".

Following is the Northport Herald's announcement of removal and change of name: "With the week of Friday, February 28, The Herald will have been published 53 issues and remained the year, according to the agreement which John W. Thomas, the founder, made with the people here. After that date the paper will be published in Bridgeport, as The Bridgeport Herald, if no preventing providence. We are satisfied that Northport has a brilliant future, but so far in the future that the present generation will all be dead before those hopes are realized. It is now three years old—has twelve residence houses and twenty adult population. It has one general store and a lumber yard, both run by honorable people, but not sufficient in number to support a paper. For reasons of their own the people on the north side are hostile to Northport, and while they have all been friendly to The Herald they prefer to get their mail on the other side. While it is only a mile from here to the north house, it is really further away than Omaha. While we have received many compliments the past year, very few of our contemporaries have realized the difficulties with which we have contended. In making this change, we feel that our faithfulness the past year justifies us in asking for the continued good will and confidence of those who have read the paper the past ten months."
