Potato Pointers

By E. M. WILCOX, Department of Agricultural Botany, and R. A. EMERSON, Department of Horticulture.

Reduced Acreage

The prevalence of potato diseases has greatly reduced the acreage of potatoes in Colorado and parts of Nebraska. It is probable also that the low prices of the past year will have a tendency to discourage potato planting in other sections of the Middle West. If it works out in this way, prices should be better next season and this should be a good year to grow potatoes.

Increased Yields

Whether or not it is wise to increase the acreage in potatoes this year, it will certainly pay to increase the yield per acre. This can be done by planting GOOD SEED, on GOOD SOIL, and giving the crop GOOD CARE.

Home-grown Seed Not Satisfactory

Good seed is the most important single item in potato culture. For central, southern, and eastern Nebraska, home-grown potatoes are not satisfactory for seed unless special methods are employed in their production. The hot soil of this region causes rapid loss of vigor. At the Nebraska Experiment Station the deterioration of home-grown potatoes ranged from about 20 per cent the first year to 50 per cent the second year.

Northern-grown Seed Pays

In these sections of the state, northern-grown seed potatoes should be planted. Such seed usually costs about 25 per cent more than home-grown seed, but the increase in yield from its use makes it worth fully 100 per cent more than home-grown seed.

Mulched Seed Potatoes

Potatoes grown in the cool soil under a mulch of straw produce as vigorous plants and as large crops as northern seed and can be produced at home at a cost per bushel little in excess of the cost of ordinary home-grown tubers.

Select Smooth, Well-shaped Tubers

Whatever the source of seed potatoes, nothing but smooth, firm, sound tubers of good shape should be planted. At the Experiment Station such seed has yielded about 60 per cent more than elongated, knobby tubers of the same stock. Wilting or sprouted seed tubers produce weaker plants and poorer yields than the seed tubers that have been kept in good condition.

Potato Breeding

By selecting seed every fall from hills that produce large yields of uniform tubers, a high yielding strain of potatoes can be produced in a few years.

Dry Rot

The dry rot is caused by a fungus that enters the tuber thru wounds. During the winter the rot makes rapid progress and this renders storage very dangerous and unprofitable in many cases. All rotted tubers should be discarded and the balance disinfected before they are placed in the cellars or pits.

Stem Rot

The fungus in this disease attacks the stem at or near the surface of the ground and results in the complete rotting off of the stem or in a greater or lesser rotting of the cortical portion of the stem. In any case the resulting stand is seriously reduced. The fungus winters over in the form of small raised dark specks on the surface of the tubers. These specks are the resting bodies of the fungus.

Leaf Curl

The exact cause of this disease is not yet known. The symptoms include (a) an upward curling of the leaves lengthwise, (b) a compact growth of the top to form a sort of rosette, and (c) the production of little potatoes at or near the surface of the soil or at other places above the surface of the soil.

Blackleg

This is a bacterial disease that has been introduced into various parts of Nebraska, no doubt thru the purchase of infected seed. In some fields during 1912 as many as 19 per cent of the plants were killed outright by this disease. The germs live over winter in the tubers and hence it is necessary to purchase seed from fields which are positively known not to have had blackleg in previous years.
