LOOK PLEASANT, PLEASE

The person who really believes in government by the people ought not to knock because disappointed in the election. One of the fundamental principles of popular government is the submission of the minority to the will of the majority. When there has been an honest election, following an approximately fair campaign, we should give earnest support to the successful candidates who were not our first choice for office as well as to those who were. A spirit of patriotism will cause defeated candidates and their friends to take the result of elections cheerfully.

ALLIANCE DID WELL

The Herald is proud of the position that Alliance and Box Butte county took on the equal suffrage amendment. The more one studies this proposition the more firmly he becomes convinced that it is a progressive measure, and for this reason it is a pleasure to note that one's own town and county does not lag behind in the procession that is marching on to adopt it sooner or later.

According to the unofficial returns published in this issue, the suffrage carried in Alliance and Box Butte county by a majority of 160 votes, but the unofficial returns do not all agree. According to another report the majority reaches 200 or more. It is evident that the official returns, which will be published in *The Herald* next week, will at least show a majority, and no doubt a fairly large majority in proportion to the total vote of the county.

PREACHED ON SAFETY FIRST

Sermon Preached by Bakersfield Divine Was Read at Alliance Safety Meeting on Oct. 29th

The "Safety First" meeting of the Alliance division of the Burlington was held in Alliance Wednesday, October 25. At this meeting a sermon preached on September 27 by Rev. James R. West, at Bakersfield, Calif., was read. Rev. West is pastor of the First Baptist church at Bakersfield and his "Safety First" service was attended by hundreds of worshippers.

Rev. West said in part: From time back when this "Safety First" movement was brought to my attention it has interested me greatly and since I have come to know more about it, it interests me more still. At the bottom it stands for this principle: Life is of more value than money or property, or anything else, and the first consideration should not be money, should not be pleasure, should not be profit, but "safety" to life and limb.

Now that principle is a safe physical principle and it is an equally good and safe moral and spiritual principle. This movement for safety, like Topsy, just "grewed," and now it is so great that it is the slogan of every up-to-date railroad and steamship company in the land. It is the slogan of every great city in the land that is spending time and dollars for sanitation to clear the rivers of infectious diseases. It is the slogan of every up-to-date concern where machinery is involved and where human life and safety is concerned.

One Company's Record
I have been delighted and surprised to see how much in earnest the railroad company and some of these other concerns are for the safety of their employees, and the safety of the public. In the promotion of safety it is interesting to me to note that the companies have suggestions along the line of safety, and that the Southern Pacific in the year 1913 had 2607 just such suggestions. To show you how it has grown, in the year 1914 there were 4013 suggestions turned in. I have a whole book of safety suggestions that are printed and distributed among railroad employees. You can see from this, extending as the Southern Pacific does, for example, as much as \$500 every day for the promotion of safety, that they are tremendously in earnest, about this matter and the safety of their employees and safety of the public. Now don't you think that inasmuch as they are doing this we should give them our co-operation?

A Crossing Suggestion
Now let's see, this crossing business. An observation in 1913 showed that 69 per cent of the people coming to crossings looked neither to the right nor left; that 2.7 per cent looked in only one direction and that 27 per cent looked in both directions, and still a little bit lower figures for horse drawn vehicles; and only 35 people out of 1000 stopped, and looked and listened in order to be certain. Whenever I come up to a railroad—and I hope I am prepared to die—I always try to think of three things. One is that the train cannot go around me; that they would have to install a side track for it to get around me, but I can get around the train because I am blessed with an automatic running gear that is more adjustable than the train. The train, I always remember, has to stick to the track, and I don't have to stick to the track. And I don't want to be mashed on the track either, and I am not going to be if I keep my senses. Then I always try to remember that a train is a great big affair and that it takes it some time to get under way and some time to stop. But when I come against an emergency signal it is astonishing how quickly I can stop.
