NEBRASKA DAY IN FLORIDA

Nearly One Hundred Representatives of Nebraska, Including Some of Alliance, Renew Acquaintance

Saturday, March 6, was Nebraska Day at Largo, Florida, where many people have gone from this state. Included in those who helped celebrate the day were several from Alliance and many from sister towns nearby. The Largo Sentinel had the following to say regarding the celebration: No social function pulled off in Largo, or any other one community in Pinellas county is deserving of more prominent mention than that of last Saturday, when nearly one hundred former citizens of Nebraska met in the oak grove near Mr. Ike M. Shriner's home in Orange Villa, Largo's exclusive residence section, for a get-together in a neighborly way and enjoy a big family picnic dinner, in honor of their native state to be known as "Nebraska Day", and on March 6, in each succeeding year it is their purpose to have these social gatherings, where they can meet each other, renew friendships, rejoice together in their successes and sympathize with each other in their misfortunes, should there be any.

The day was indeed a bright one, none better could have been furnished by the weather man had it been produced to special order, and by 10 o'clock Nebraska representatives began coming into town from all points of the compass, in wagons, buggies and automobiles, and when they had come together in the grove and the first greetings of the day were exchanged in the cordial handshake of friend meeting friend, the Largo High School Band, which was present by invitation, rendered a number of selections in an excellent manner, reflecting great credit to themselves and their splendid director, Prof. E. V. Sayers, principal of the Largo schools.

Mr. Turner introduced the editor of the Sentinel, who, by request, acted as toastmaster, and in this capacity speaking for Largo and Pinellas county welcomed these good people, who had come from their far western homes and its cold winters to our fair southland as fellow-Floridians in helping to develop the resources of this favored section. He welcomed them because they had come, not as tourists, but as investors and home builders, as producers and not as consumers and congratulated Largo and Pinellas county on having them for fellow citizens.

Dr. L. B. Payne was then introduced who spoke as the representative of the Nebraskans. Dr. Payne stated that this was his eighth winter in Florida, and while he yet claimed Nebraska as his permanent home, he had enjoyed every visit made to Florida and had identified himself with her interest to the extent of providing himself with a comfortable home here where he expected to continue to divide his time and avoid the severe winters of the northwest. The doctor said that people talked about hard times, but the happy, prosperous looking gathering before him and the splendid dinner served indicated that this was not true as to this section, for after all had been filled the tables showed that many baskets full were left.

Rev. M. O. Williams was next introduced, who made a nice talk and referred to a true story, in the pioneer days of Florida and the good accomplished by those who had come among the old settlers as developers and home builders, and as such welcomed Nebraskans and the good citizens of Florida.

Rev. W. A. Cameron came next and made a splendid talk, as a Larkite by adoption, because of the environments and advantages of this locality over any other that he had found in the state.

Dr. Robt. McMullen was introduced as an original Floridian, and gave some interesting data as to the early history of Pinellas county and especially that portion in and around Largo.

Mr. Ike M. Shriner was called, but responded that he was too busy attending a young Nebraska-Floridian to try to talk to grown folks.

It was a pleasant day, even if it was the 6th of March, out in the open, with a clear sky minus the ice, wind and snow that prevailed in old Nebraska land.
