FROM DENVER TO SIOUX FALLS DIRECT

Plan to Connect the Two Cities Receiving Much Encouragement Along the Line

ALLIANCE WOULD BE DIVISION

A direct line of railroad connecting Denver with Sioux Falls, South Dakota, has been suggested by business men of the latter place. Tore Teigen of Sioux Falls was a visitor at the Chamber of Commerce this week. "Business men of Sioux Falls," said Mr. Teigen, "have gone quite deeply into the discussion of a railroad that will connect them more directly with Denver. Both Sioux Falls and the Twin Cities—Minneapolis and St. Paul—have had the Denver territory in view for some time. The Great Northern railway already extends to Sioux Falls, and it is generally understood that surveys have been made westward as far as the Missouri river. If the Great Northern could be induced to build to Alliance, Nebraska, or some other convenient connecting point, it would mean a bridging of the gap that now exists. Colorado traffic could then utilize a direct line into South Dakota and Minnesota and not be compelled to go by the way of Omaha in reaching the great wheat fields and farms of our region."

Mr. Teigen while here discussed the matter with several members of the Chamber of Commerce and suggested that committees of the Denver Chamber and the Commercial Club of Sioux Falls be appointed to make an investigation of the project.

The above article is from "The Commercial", the official organ of the Denver Chamber of Commerce, and bears the stamp of authenticity. The name of Alliance had never been suggested to either the Sioux Falls or the Denver commercial bodies—it merely came to them as the logical place as a connection and division point, as it rightly is.

The benefit of such a road through Alliance cannot be estimated at this time, but it would be worth thousands of dollars if one uses dollars and cents as a basis. A connection of this nature is the one greatly needed improvement in western Nebraska, and eventually it must be built. With such organizations as these behind the project, it looms up on the horizon in large proportions, and does not have the appearance of the common "paper roads."

Secretary Fisher is taking the matter up with the secretaries of both the Denver and Sioux Falls commercial clubs, and more commercial clubs will be added to the list in a short time. It is evident that the matter is going to be pushed and the status of affairs will soon be known. No other town in western Nebraska is so admirably situated as a connecting point as is Alliance, and the fact that it has been mentioned right at the start will give it an appreciable lead.

FEDERAL COURT PROCEEDINGS

Held at Chadron Monday with New U. S. Attorney and Marshal on Hand

Chadron, Nebr., Sept. 13—The District Court of the United States, for the District of Nebraska, Chadron division, convened here today at 9 a. m. Present: Hon. Thomas C. Munger, judge presiding; T. J. Flynn, United States marshal; J. B. Nickerson, deputy United States marshal; T. S. Allen, United States district attorney; R. C. Hoyt, United States court clerk; L. J. F. Jaeger, deputy clerk.

Court having been opened in due form by law by the U. S. marshal, the following proceedings were had and done, to-wit:

United States of America vs. Eva Rich, shooting with intent to kill. Nolle prosequere entered by United States attorney, by leave of court.

United States of America vs. E. E. Long. Purchasing government property. Defendant allowed to withdraw plea of "not guilty" entered September, 1914, and leave granted by the court to enter his plea of "guilty" as charged in the indictment.

Recent Sales of Western Nebraska Cattle on South Omaha Market—Box Butte Represented

Recent sales of cattle from western Nebraska on the South Omaha market are:

Monday, September 6: J. M. Gentry, of Grant county, sold four cars of cattle, which included 42 feeders that averaged 1135 pounds and sold at \$7.45, and 26 cows that averaged 1,019 pounds and sold at \$5.75. C. C. Gentry sold four feeders that averaged 1145 pounds and sold at \$7.45, and 4 cows that averaged 1,019 pounds and sold at \$5.75.

Herman Bauer of Box Butte county sold 15 feeders that averaged 1,273 pounds and sold at \$7.35. E. E. Jesse sold 36 feeders that averaged 1,166 pounds and sold at \$7.30, and 6 cows that averaged 1,048 pounds and sold at \$5.75. William Rust, Sr., sold 10 stockers that averaged 662 pounds and sold at \$6.70.

Tuesday, September 7: J. H. Minor of Grant county sold six cars of cattle, which included 52 heifers that averaged 1,057 pounds and sold at \$6.60; 20 cows that averaged 1,027 pounds and sold at \$5.70; and 16 cows that averaged 1,108 pounds and brought \$5.40.

John L. McCormick of Scotts Bluff county sold 17 cows and heifers that averaged 966 pounds and sold at \$5.65. H. L. Sams sold 9 heifers that averaged 792 pounds and sold at \$5.65, and 11 cows and heifers that averaged 807 pounds and sold at \$5.15. W. F. Ganser sold 20 feeders that averaged 1,078 pounds and sold at \$7.05.
